This baby of Juliana and her consort, the German Bernhard, will arrive about the first of the year to be heir or heiress-presumptive to the throne from which firm Queen Wilhelmina now rules Holland. Juliana is the present heir apparent; she has no brothers or sisters.

No public gifts for the baby will be accepted. That last edict didn't daunt Netherlands' housewives. They are sewing and knitting just as hard as Juliana's circle but the gifts will go to needy children born in the same month as the little itizen of Soestdijk.

Timely Recipes

PUMPKIN PIE

One of the old Puritan ministers called pumpkin "a fruit which the Lord fed his people with till corn and cattle increased," and it is quite true that the pumpkin—easily grown, easily cooked and easily kept in a dried state, as the colonists learned from the Indians—must sometimes have seemed like a gift from heaven to the hungry settlers of the New World. At first the pumpkin was served as "pumpkin sauce", but it was not long before the enterprising pioneer cook had concocted it into a pie. She used maple syrup as sweetening—another native American food to which the Indians introduced the white man.

Pumpkin Pie
1 cup steamed, strained pumpkin;
½ teaspoon salt;
1 teaspoon ginger;
½ teaspoon cloves;
2 teaspoons cinnamon;
3 eggs;
1 1-3 cups (1 can) sweetened condensed milk;
1 cup water.
Unbaked pie crust (9-inch).
Thoroughly mix steamed, strained and mashed pumpkin, salt, ginger, cloves, cinnamon, eggs, sweetened condensed milk and water. Pour into unbaked pie crust. Bake in hot oven (450 deg. F.) 10 minutes, then reduce temperature to moderate (350 deg. F.) and bake about 35 minutes longer, on until the filling has set.
