The next and last building passed by the sidewalk is the Municipal "Hello House," which, though a busy centre, costs no shoe leather to reach, and has no special need of a sidewalk. The sidewalk ends at Second street just opposite The News' office.

Now on the other side of the street, where there is no sidewalk, there are a great many business premises. First, there is Wallace's department store, still isolated by morasses and rockpiles. Then there is Mr. Kauffman's music store, also isolated by contractors' leavings. There is the Empire newspaper office, the McCaffery & Gibbons residential and business block with William Grant's plumbing office and show rooms and E. L. Fisher's funeral chapel. Besides this there are several occupied flats, where women and children live, all of which are reached across makeshift side planks. Last, but not least, there is The News office, access to which is over a wilderness of jagged rocks.

By every rule of obvious public need the sidewalk should have been run down the opposite side of the street to that which it now adorns. Why was it not so built? Is it because the vacant lot next to the Telephone Central is owned by Alderman Hilditch, and the corner next to Mr. Barrow's house is leased by him, or is it just because he doesn't want Alderman Newton or The Daily News to have a sidewalk?

Full credit to Herbert H. Stevens, Conservative member of Parliament for Vancouver, for advocating in the House of Commons the settlement of a thousand Labrador fishermen and their families upon the coast of Northern British Columbia. It is the most states manlike contribution that has yet been made for the upbuilding of a white man's fishery on our coasts.

It is idle to protest against yellow labor in the fisheries when no other labor offers. Economic laws pay no heed to protests and prejudices. The yellow man is not to be driven out-he must be displaced.

To bring a thousand Labrador fishermen to the North Pacific Coast is an act of mercy, of which a modern Portia might say:

"It is twice blessed. It blesseth him that gives And him that doth receive."

A thousand fishermen and their families transplanted from the rigors of Labrador to the genial coasts and well stocked banks of Hecate Straits would be transplanted from poverty to comfort themselves, and would do a great deal to enrich the district they would settle in and the government that would aid them hither.

The fishermen of Labrador are poor. "desperately poor, but the kindest and bravest people I have ever come across," says Colpitts Robinson in his latest book on Labrador. They would have to be assisted here. But the money so spent would reap rich dividends, and do more than any amount of bloodshed and treasure to solve the problem of the Oriental on our coasts.

The Labrador fisherman who brings his family and his Labrador customs with him will be an asset to settlement, too. Each family tills the little homestead while the man is out at sea. "Simple in faith, honest in purpose, their hospitality limited by circumstances, courageous in adversity, resourceful in danger," the Labrador fisherman as depicted by Dr. Wilfrid Grenfell would prove a valuable asset to this young and rich country. It is no secret that the local Liberal Executive of last year was urging that steps be taken to import white fishermen for our fisheries. Their plans were cut off shortly by the unexpected fatality on September 21st last. The knowledge that one of the British Columbia members at least is striving to secure the importation of white fishermen to our coasts should and will meet with warm encouragement from all sides. The News suggests that resolutions in support of this policy be passed by the various political, trade and patriotic societies throughout the district and forwarded before the House reassembles to all the members of Parliament who represent British Columbia constituencies.
