THE CHINESE SITUATION

Evidently the Chinese are following out their original plans of retreating as pressure from the Japanese army increased. The great difficulty seems to be to sustain the morale of the Chinese troops under these conditions. Should it be decided to evacuate Nanking it would mean that the Japanese would then be in possession of a most strategic section of the country. It is also possible that, once Nanking is taken, the Japanese may refuse to advance farther into the country, resting content with the gains made.

EUROPEAN MIX-UP

It is very difficult for anyone to understand the European mix-up. The two dictatorships, Italy and France, are more in the public eye than any other countries. The Russians are not very demonstrative and Britain seems to be trying to be friendly with all parties. France is socially inclined but not very red. Other countries do not seem to count very much although they may prove to be deciding factors in case of a struggle. The Spanish embargo continues without any present hope of a letup. It is all very puzzling and unfortunate. In the meantime all countries, especially Britain, are working hard on military preparedness.

A HAPPY IDEA

It was a happy thought for the officers and crew of the herring seiners Chief Skugaid and the Zenardi to distribute several tons of herring to the unemployed and other citizens who wished to partake. Every man, woman and child who asked was given all he or she could carry away and there was great feeding in many homes that day.

It is several years since a free distribution such as this has been carried out in Prince Rupert. Possibly the early arrival of the fish in such large quantities inspired the idea that the whole city should share in the bounteous harvest.
