## AINS HOLD UP ADVANCE

Chinese Unable to Make Much Headway in China Owing to Rain

### Cities Bombed

Shanghai, Nov. 24: (CP)—The Japanese are reported to have decided against carrying out their plan in Shantung Province where they have extensive commercial and industrial interests which they are suffering from the carrying on of destruction by military operations.

Cities Bombed  
Chinese planes bombarded Canton, China's southern metropolis, more than an hour today and planes reaching here said that more than one hundred civilians had been killed. The war planes dropped projectiles which were aimed at railways and stations.

Reports received here also said that two Japanese planes, protected by pursuit craft, dropped a score of bombs along the main streets of Nanking, killing forty. The bombardment of Nanking came as forces confirmed reports of a Russian manufacturer's planes having arrived at the airport to bolster up the Chinese.

### TWO DEAD IN WRECK

Locomotive and Box Car Go Through Bridge on Kettle Valley Railway Line  
PRINCETON, Nov. 24: (CP)—Two men were killed yesterday when a locomotive and a box car on a west-bound Canadian Pacific Railway train went through a bridge in the Kettle Valley west of here. The two dead men are W. E. Moore, brakeman, and John Collins, engine worker. The box car was crushed through the bridge in the Coquihalla River. The bridge is under repair when the train passed. The rest of the train crew was uninjured.

## Chief Justice Is Appointed

Ewen McPherson K.C. is named for Province of Manitoba

OTTAWA, Nov. 24:—Premier W. L. Mackenzie King last night announced the appointment of Hon. Ewen A. McPherson K.C. as chief justice of the province of Manitoba Court of King's Bench, succeeding Chief Justice D. A. Macdonald who died last month. Mr. McPherson is a former provincial treasurer and member of the House of Commons.

## TAKING OVER COAL MINES

Nationalization Bill Is Given Its Second Reading in British House of Commons

LONDON, Nov. 24: (CP)—The bill to nationalize coal royalties was passed on second reading by a large majority in Parliament yesterday. Under the bill all coal mines of the country would pass into the control of the government within four years. By a system of royalties the owners would be compensated.

# Tightening Up On Stock Trading

## DETAILS OF PLOT

French Minister of Interior Tells More About Activities of "Hooded Ones"

PARIS, Nov. 24: (CP)—Minister of the Interior Marx Dormoy told yesterday of a plot which had been uncovered to overthrow the government of France and restore the monarchy. Dormoy named the secret organization of "The Hooded Ones" in connection with the plot. A huge quantity of arms, ammunition and general fighting equipment had been found secreted in the basements of Paris buildings. Dormoy did not directly associate this plot with the manifesto of the Duc de Guise, exiled pretender to the throne of France, who declared yesterday that he had decided to "reconquer the throne of my fathers" in order to deliver France from communism on one hand and fascism on the other. Surete Nationale officials promise mass arrests as the government announces that it has broken the conspiracy to turn France into a dictatorship under a King. The uprising is said to have been planned to be similar to that in Spain.

## S.O.S. Message Sent Out But Countermanded

NASSAU, Nov. 24:—The British steamer Knollington Court, reporting that she had struck some obstruction at sea, sent out an "S.O.S." message last night but later countermanded it, stating that she was in no danger. The Knollington Court is at a position south of the Bahamas.

## THREE-WAY CONFERENCE

Britain, It Is Reported, Would Bring Germany and France Together

LONDON, Nov. 24: (CP)—There were reports here last night that as an outcome of the conversations in Germany last week between Viscount Halifax, Lord President of the Council, and Chancellor Adolf Hitler and other German leaders, Great Britain would endeavor to open tri-lateral negotiations between herself and Germany and France. The British government was reported to have sent a report to the French government on the conference between Hitler and Halifax and that France had been invited to take part in an early conference.

## MARKET TO REORGANIZE

Chairman of Securities Commission Issues Orders to New York Stock Exchange

NEW YORK, Nov. 24: (CP)—William L. Douglas, chairman of the Securities Commission, issued an order yesterday requiring the New York stock market to reorganize or be reorganized along drastic lines. More adequate trading regulations must be put into effect, asserted Douglas.

## MARKETING OF HEMLOCK

Member For Skeena Urges More Equitable Distribution. Would Retire Aged Civil Servants

VICTORIA, Nov. 24:—E. T. Kenney, Liberal member for Skeena, suggested in the Legislature last night the increased marketing of hemlock as a means of relieving the depletion of fir. He said he thought the more equitable distribution between hemlock and fir sales of the lumber extension grant which had been used almost exclusively for fir.

## Too Much Rain On Prairies Is Latest Trouble

OTTAWA, Nov. 24: (CP)—Owing to recent rains, only half of the feed required to take care of stock in Alberta and Saskatchewan is available and there will have to be strict rationing, Hon. James G. Gardiner, minister of agriculture, announces.

## INDUSTRIES ARE ACTIVE

Things Humming in Old Land—Number of Workless is Away Down

LONDON, Nov. 24: (CP)—A further marked increase in all industrial and business activity of the United Kingdom is announced in government reports. Unemployment in the areas of England and Wales where they have been so many workless has been reduced by 25.6 per cent although 200,000 are still out of work there. The government is preparing to make extensive expenditures to take care of them. The rearmament program continues to provide employment for a large number.

## REBUKED BY POPE

Father Coughlin Has No Reply To Maketo Pontiff's Reproof

DETROIT, Nov. 24:—Father Charles E. Coughlin, Detroit's former "radio priest," through his secretary, announced that he will have no reply to make to a public rebuke of him made by Pope Pius. The Pontiff announced he had approved the action of the Archbishop of Detroit in questioning Father Coughlin. Snubbed by K.C.'s HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 24:—Father Charles E. Coughlin's National Union of Social Justice organization was refused the use of the Knights of Columbus Hall here for a meeting which had to be held elsewhere.

## His Extradition Is Being Sought

NEW YORK, Nov. 24: (CP)—Former President Gerardo Machado of Cuba has agreed to appear in court next Monday when extradition proceedings against him will be heard. His return to Cuba is sought on charges of murder and embezzlement.

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## NEW GOVERNOR OF ONTARIO

Mathews to Succeed Dr. H. A. Bruce It Is Announced

TORONTO, Nov. 24: (CP)—Appointment is announced of Albert Mathews, prominent Ontario financier, as the new Lieutenant Governor of Ontario. He assumes office on November 30 succeeding Dr. H. A. Bruce who has completed his term of office. Mr. Mathews is a brother of Hon. R. C. Mathews, former federal minister of national revenue in the administration of former Premier R. B. Bennett. He will not occupy the palatial government house which will be closed. Mr. Mathews is head of the brokerage firm which bears his name. Duncan Marshall, who had been recommended for the Lieutenant Governorship by Premier Mitchell Hepburn but who was not acceptable to Premier King, is expected to be appointed to the Senate. Dr. Bruce announced his resignation Monday.

## Legislation Introduced At Victoria To Make Stricter Regulations

Motor Vehicle Act Also Being Amended Under New Statutes Brought Into House By Attorney General Wismer

VICTORIA, November 24: (CP)—Legislation to provide stricter regulations for brokers and mining company officials was introduced in the Legislature yesterday by Hon. Gordon Wismer, Attorney General. The new Security Act was one of the major pieces of legislation outlined by the government in public announcements before being presented to the House. The other involves amendments to the Motor Vehicle Act, it being also introduced yesterday by Mr. Wismer and receiving first reading.

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## DETAILS OF PLAN

Premier Aberhart Wants More Information on Unemployment Insurance Scheme

OTTAWA, Nov. 24: (CP)—Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King yesterday announced that details of his proposed unemployment insurance plan, to effect which he is asking the co-operation of the provinces in securing necessary amendments to the British North America Act, will not be given to the public until legislation is brought into Parliament. In his reply to Premier King, Premier William Aberhart of Alberta stated yesterday that he required more specific information before expressing himself. Unless unemployment insurance were financed by debt free creation of national credit, he would hesitate to support the plan, said Aberhart.

## House Of Lords Rejects Measure

Thumbs Down on Bill Which Would Have Confiscated Cars In Drunken Manslaughter Cases

LONDON, Nov. 24: (CP)—The House of Lords yesterday rejected a bill which would have provided for the confiscation of automobiles of all persons convicted of manslaughter in deaths arising out of driving while intoxicated.

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
