**Native Visitors
 Are Thinning Out**

Native visitors who were much in evidence in the city last week following the closing of sockeye fishing season on the Skeena River are beginning to thin out now. The presence of the natives in town lent considerably to the holiday spirit around the city incidental to Port Day and other activities. There was an approach to the atmosphere which years ago used to pervade the Fair Week activities here. Among the events were a number of native dances held in various halls, two or three village dance orchestras having been here including Kispiox Greenville and Kincolth. The touring Show Boat orchestra also held dances in the Moose Hall which were well patronized. The Boston and Metropole Halls were also in use.

**WHIFFLETS
 From The Waterfront**

Four western halibut vessels sold catches totalling 130,000 pounds at Seattle yesterday as follows: Van-see, 40,000 pounds, Sebastian, 9 3/4c and 9c; Recovery, 25,000, Booth 11 3/4c and 9c; Sylvia, 25,000, New England, 10 1/2c and 9c; Polaris, 49,000, Whiz, 10 3/4c and 9 1/2c. One local vessel, the Lane, sold 2,000 pounds of halibut caught incidental to cod fishing in Area No. 2 at 12c, receiving 4 1/2c for 13,500 pounds of sablefish, 4c for 1,500 pounds of ling cod and 5c for 2,000 pounds of red cod. The following vessels sold albacore at Seattle yesterday at 5c per pound: Irene J., 25,000 pounds; Lively, 35,000 pounds; Tacoma, 23,000, Swift II, 25,000; Eastern, 25,000; Freya, 12,000.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, arrived in port at 11:30 this morning from Stewart, Anyox and other northern points and sailed at 1:30 this afternoon for Vancouver and waypoints. The Catala brought in a large list of passengers today from the north including workers from Arrandale and Mill Bay going south now the season is over.

Bringing in passengers to catch the steamer North Sea for Seattle, Pilot Bob Ellis arrived at 7:15 last evening from Ketchikan with his seaplane and left at 9:30 this morning on his return to Ketchikan.

Northland Transportation Co.'s steamer North Sea, Capt. A. W. Nickerson, arrived in port at 8:15 last evening from Alaska and, after discharging a carload and a half of frozen and mild cured fish for transshipment East over Canadian National Railways, sailed at 9:15 p.m. in continuation of her voyage to Seattle.
