## Building Total In City For Year To Date Is \$340,730

The total of building permits in Prince Rupert for the year 1939 to date stands at \$340,730 in comparison with \$26,924 during the first ten months of 1937. The increase is, of course, due to the new federal and hospital buildings. Permits for October this year amounted to \$42,000 as against \$780 in October 1937.
