WORK ON HIGHWAY

Completed and This May Take Three Years

Activity Shown

Local Chamber Passes Resolution of Appreciation of Work of E. T. Kenney M.L.A.

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, at its regular meeting last night, passes a resolution of appreciation of the work being done by E. T. Kenney in his capacity as member of the Legislature for Skeena in connection with highway construction.

The matter was introduced by S. E. Parker, who referred to the immense amount of work done by Mr. Kenney in connection with the scheme. There was now only 26 miles of new highway to construct to connect Terrace with the outside and this, it was estimated, would cost \$200,000. The difficulty in securing money was the insistent demand for roads in the south. It was thought that the connection with Terrace would be completed in three years at the least. As soon as the present piece of rock work was completed, there would be comparatively easy construction and, by the end of the year, is was hoped to be as far as Pacific.
