### EDITORIAL

#### MIGHT INVITE KING

It seems reasonable that such an important outpost of the Empire as Prince Rupert should be visited by the King and Queen when on their Canadian tour. The city is different from anything else they could see in Canada and the people would give them a hearty western welcome, people of all nationalities or countries of origin joining for the purpose. We suggest that it would be a good thing for the city commissioned to send them a formal invitation and that, if they come, the reception be not confined to a favored few but be open to all the people.

#### BRITISH BY-ELECTIONS

The British by-elections seem to indicate that the British people are opposed to the policy of the Chamberlain government, although there is no very decided opposition, possibly not enough to defeat the government in a general election. Possibly by the time the New Year comes the people of that country may be more satisfied that the Chamberlain peace is a real thing with possibilities of continuing. On the other hand, it may be that conditions will show the futility of trying to make peace with the dictators. It might be a good thing to reduce the majority of the government. Many readers of this paper would like to see it beaten and a Labor administration take its place with a strong anti-Fascist policy.
