CURSE OF CYNICISM

Too Much Material, Too Little
Spiritual, Declares Pastor

At evening service in First United Church Sunday, Rev. J. C. Jackson spoke on the curse of cynicism—those who "sit in the seat of the scornful." The preacher claimed that moral cynicism was a greater evil than mental skepticism. People lived too much in the material world. They simply did not think of the spiritual. How different was Christ. He believed thoroughly in the person. He had every faith in the social order and what it would develop into. Nowadays the social order seemed chaotic. Family life was not on the high level that could be wished for. Divorce was common. The cynics did not understand the mentality of the Beatitudes. Cynicism was fatal to beliefs. It destroyed a people. It damned where faith created and it was faith that was needed. "We need faith in the possibilities of the social order, faith in people and faith in God. 'Now are we the sons of God' is a challenge we must accept," declared the pastor.

In the morning the text was "For He grew up before Him as a root out of a dry ground." This growth was extraordinary. It was out of dry ground. But even more extraordinary was the strength of the plant. It was no weakly growth for it was Christ Himself. Little could be attributed to heredity, little to His environment. There was nothing in the mental and moral atmosphere of His time to
