MEMEL, Lithuania, December 12.—Disorders have broken out in Memel, now Lithuania's chief seaport which was German before the Great War, following elections yesterday for local Parliament in which the Nazi party won with a decisive majority. Now the Nazis are demanding full autonomy as a first move, it is believed, to-

wards joining up with Germany. There is reason to believe that Chancellor Hitler's next expansionary move will be in this direction and that it will come soon.

Today it was declared by decree that Lithuanian police powers were ended in Memel and that only police of autonomous Memel would have authority in the district which adjoins Germany.

The British government is joining France in representations concerning the possibility of a movement to absorb Memel as a sequel to the elections.
