Negro Title Holder Gave Garcia Bad Beating In First 11 Rounds And Fought Off Closing Attack

NEW YORK, November 26: (CP)—Henry Armstrong, Los Angeles negro, successfully defended his world's welterweight title here last night for the first time since winning it from Barney Ross. He outpointed Ceferino Garcia in fifteen fast and furious rounds which roused a howling crowd of fans in Madison Square Garden. Armstrong gave Garcia a bad beating about the head and body with his slashing lefts and rights during the first eleven rounds and, at the start of the twelfth round, Referee Art Donovan looked Garcia over to make sure he was fit to go on. During the last four rounds the Filipino engaged in rushes that obviously hurt the little colored mammerer but failed to slow up his terrific pace.

Weights were: Armstrong, 133½ pounds; Garcia, 146. The weight advantage was, undoubtedly, a great factor in Garcia's favor and a corresponding handicap for Armstrong.

In the first round Garcia took the lead and forced the pace but it was not long before Armstrong took command which he maintained with fierce and effective leather throwing. Neither fighter spared an effort and a great pace was driven. On several occasions Garcia was forced into the ropes by his much lighter opponent. While the negro did the most effective hitting, the Filipino was not without a lively response, particularly towards the close although he never faltered.
