## LOG SCALE DECREASE

Forest Production Not So Large This Year as it was in 1937

The log scale in Prince Rupert forestry district for the year 1938 to date has reached a total of 119,560,671 board feet in comparison with 149,067,112 board feet in the corresponding period of last year. The scale of 7,501,887 board feet this November was just a little more than half of the 14,565,653 board feet recorded in the corresponding month last year.

Pole and pile production in the interior this November, totalling 77,715 lineal feet—59,021 lineal feet cedar, 4,224 lineal feet hemlock and 14,470 lineal feet miscellaneous—compared with 188,408 lineal feet in the same month last year.

The tie count this November was 10,214 pieces, all jackpine, as against 33,703 pieces in November 1937.

Fifty cords of wood were recorded this November in comparison with 22 a year ago.

## RUGBY CLUB IS FORMED

Coach Points Out Fine Points of Game as Pictures Shown

WINNIPEG, Dec. 3: (CP)—The Quarterback Club, an organization believed unique in Canada, has provided Winnipeg football fans with a golden opportunity of acquainting themselves with the fine points of the game.

Formed last October by Manager Joe Ryan of Winnipeg Blue Bombers, the club brings moving pictures of Winnipeg's games to fans and players alike, with a general discussion conducted by Coach Reg Threlfall following each showing.

Lean Joseph has announced that moving pictures of the Dominion final between Bombers and the eastern champions will be brought back for the grandstand quarterbacks in the Club's final meeting of the 1938 season.

Since the October day when first the Club was formed, detailed movies of each Bomber game have been shown members of the organization whose fees are 25c a session. About 200 turned out for the inaugural show and 1,100 crammed to see pictures of Bombers first playoff game at Calgary November 5 against Carl Cronin's Bronks.

Lean Joseph has been eminently satisfied with response given the new project and said he thought the pictures had "greatly stimulated" Winnipeg's football interest.

Coach Threlfall, an accomplished after-dinner speaker, directs proceedings at Quarterback gatherings. Reg usually sees the pictures prior to club meetings and searches for points of interest to the average fan.

As the pictures unfold, Threlfall offers explanatory comment, indicating clever blocking and tackling and explaining various phases of defensive and offensive formations.

Following the pictures, fans are allowed to ask questions concerning football tactics and Threlfall answers them. From the outset, interest in the new project spread until at the last meeting the pictures had to be run twice to accommodate the hundreds of fans clamoring for admittance.

Players, at the same time, benefit from the pictures. Threlfall is able to point out mistakes simply and accurately and offer corrective criticism.
