CAUSE SET FOR CRASH

Fog and Fatal Error of Judgment Believed Responsible for Trans-Canada Disaster

OTTAWA, Dec. 3: (CP)-Fog and) a fatal error of judgment by Pilot Darmid Imrie were responsible for the crash near Regina on November 18 of a TransCanada Air Lines air liner in which Imrie and his co-pilot, Jack Herald, lost their lives. 
