C.P.R. steamer Princess Charlotte, Capt. William Palmer, which was in port yesterday afternoon southbound from Skagway to Vancouver, will be here again next Monday morning northbound on her final voyage of the season on the Alaska route. The vessel had 226 passengers aboard yesterday afternoon including nine who disembarked at this port, a similar number taking passage from here for the south aboard her.

Two western halibut boats landed catches at Seattle yesterday as follows: Sea Bird, 29,000 pounds; San Juan, 11 1/2, and 9c; Radio, 40,000 pounds; Sebastian, 10 1/2, and 9c. The Bertha landed 500 pounds of halibut at 14 1/2c, the halibut having been taken in local waters incidental to cod fishing.

On a special voyage to Alaska with a party of nearly three hundred members of the National Life Insurance Co. of Minnesota on board, C. N. R. steamer Prince Robert, Capt. H. E. Nedden, is here today on her final appearance of the season at this port. The vessel arrived at 8.30 this morning and sailed at noon for Skagway and other points. She will not call here southbound. The Robert's party totals 280 persons representing twenty-two western states with the majority from Minnesota.

TOTALITARIAN STROKE MAY BE COMING IT IS BELIEVED

Foreign Secretary Viscount Halifax at the Foreign Office during the morning and a short time later Chancellor of the Exchequer Sir John Simon returned from a vacation in Scotland and joined them. Chamberlain was reported not so much worried regarding the next step in regard to Nationalist rejection of the volunteers plan as he was of the probability that Italy will continue to send replacement drafts of Blackshirts to Spain.

Diplomatic observers expressed the belief today that a crisis would probably soon be reached in Czechoslovakia's Sudeten German problem, pointing either to complete agreement or an open break. This opinion was stated after a hurried conference of British government officials.

Meanwhile at Praha, democratic Germans of the Social Democratic party there have expressed opposition to Sudeten policies as being designed to enforce Nazi plans and have asked the Czech government to resist the Sudeten drive towards totalitarian principles.

Sudeten German Party leader Konrad Henlein disclosed Wednesday night that he will lead a large delegation of Sudeten minority leaders to Nuremberg Germany in September for the annual Nazi Party Congress.

At Vienna the Volksbund of Austrian Catholics, a cultural organization, has been suppressed by Nazi authorities, the United Press was informed Wednesday.

HOW TO MAKE ICED TEA

Infuse six heaping teaspoons of Salada Black Tea in a pint of fresh, boiling water. After six minutes strain liquid into two-quart container. While hot, add 1 to 1 1/2 cups of granulated sugar and juice of 2 lemons, strained. Stir well until sugar is dissolved, fill container with cold water. Do not allow tea to cool before adding the cold water, otherwise liquid will become cloudy. Serve with chipped ice.

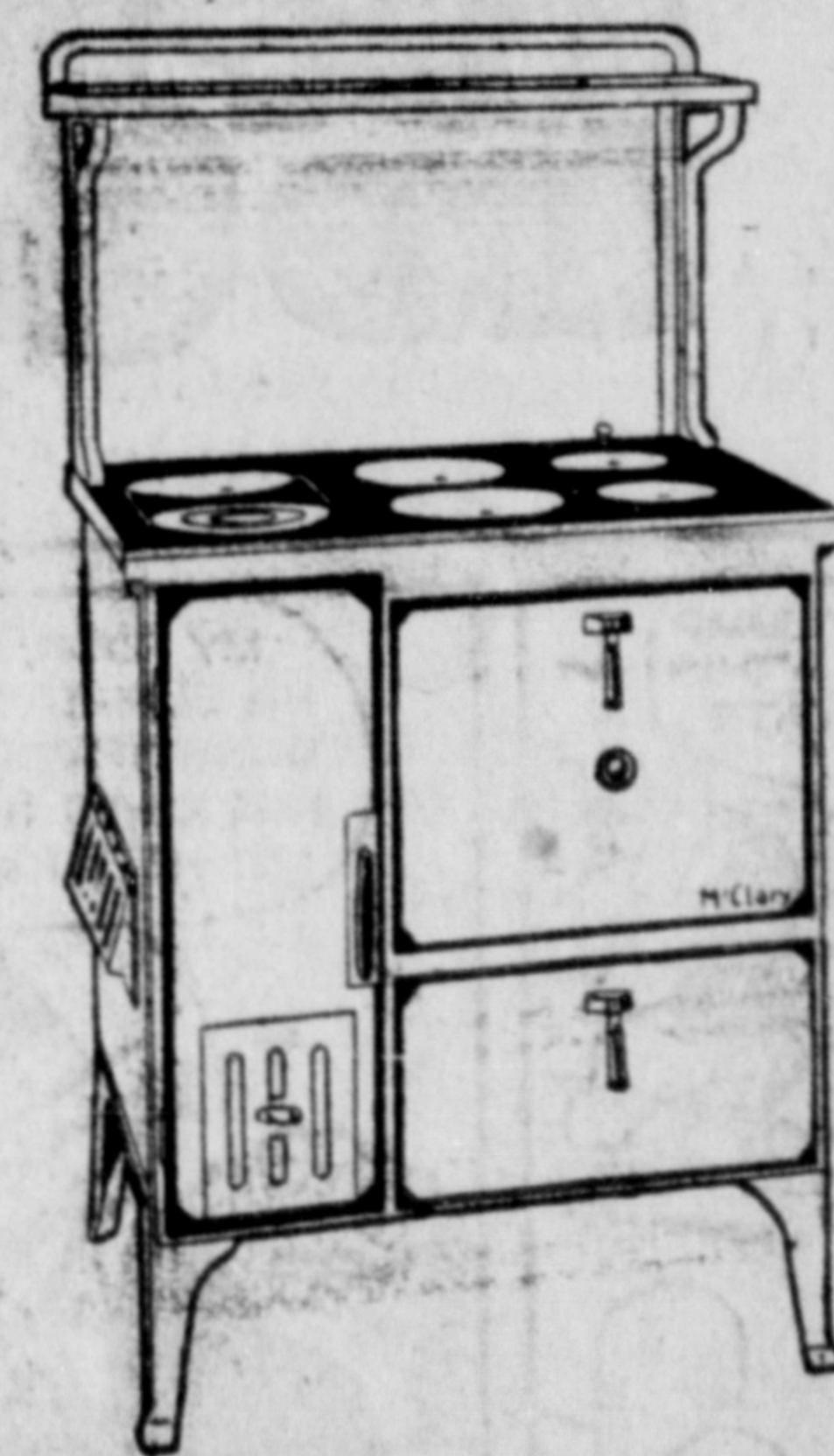

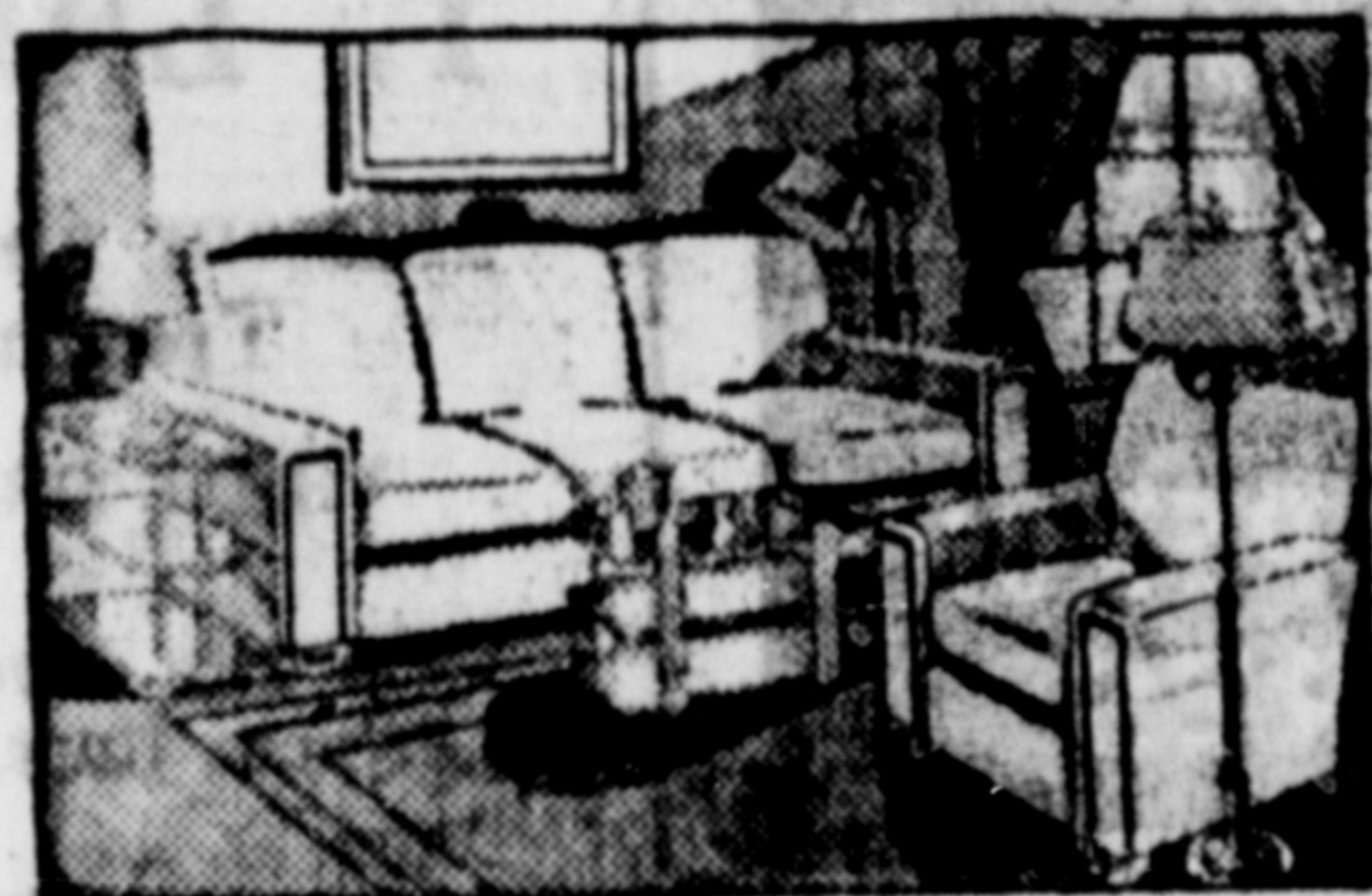
