TRIBUTE TO DR. WRINCH

Resolution is Passed By Natives of Kitzegukla

KITZEGUKLA, Feb. 16.—At the Kitzegukla United Church the following resolution was passed regarding the work of Dr. Leonard B. Wrinch, medical superintendent of Hazelton Hospital who is leaving Hazelton at the end of the month. "It is with the deepest regret that we, the native people of Kitzegukla learn of the resignation of our local doctor, Dr. L. B. Wrinch. We feel that his departure from our district will mean the breaking up of a long line of useful Christian service as well as the closing of a faithful ministry of healing. No one realizes more than the Indian people what a debt this district owes to the Wrinch family.

"We had hoped that for a life time perhaps, Dr. Wrinch would have carried on the work begun by his revered father.

"During his work among us, Dr. Wrinch has made a deep and very favorable impression upon our people. While he is different than his father, he has his own particular attractions. Through these he has won the respect and confidence of our people in a remarkable way.

"For many years he has been our doctor and, since his appointment to the position of superintendent about a year and a half ago, has carried on the policy adopted by his father. Whenever any Indian attends the hospital he is welcomed and received with courtesy, whether he is there as a visitor or patient.

"We the natives of Kitzegukla Reserve, wish to assure Dr. L. B. Wrinch that his services have been appreciated and we wish him every success in his new field of service."

It is thought that the eye might be saved without any impairment of vision but it is still too soon to know definitely.

Mr. Dieter is a young man about 22 years of age and was raised in the Bulkley Valley where he has many friends who will regret to hear of his accident.

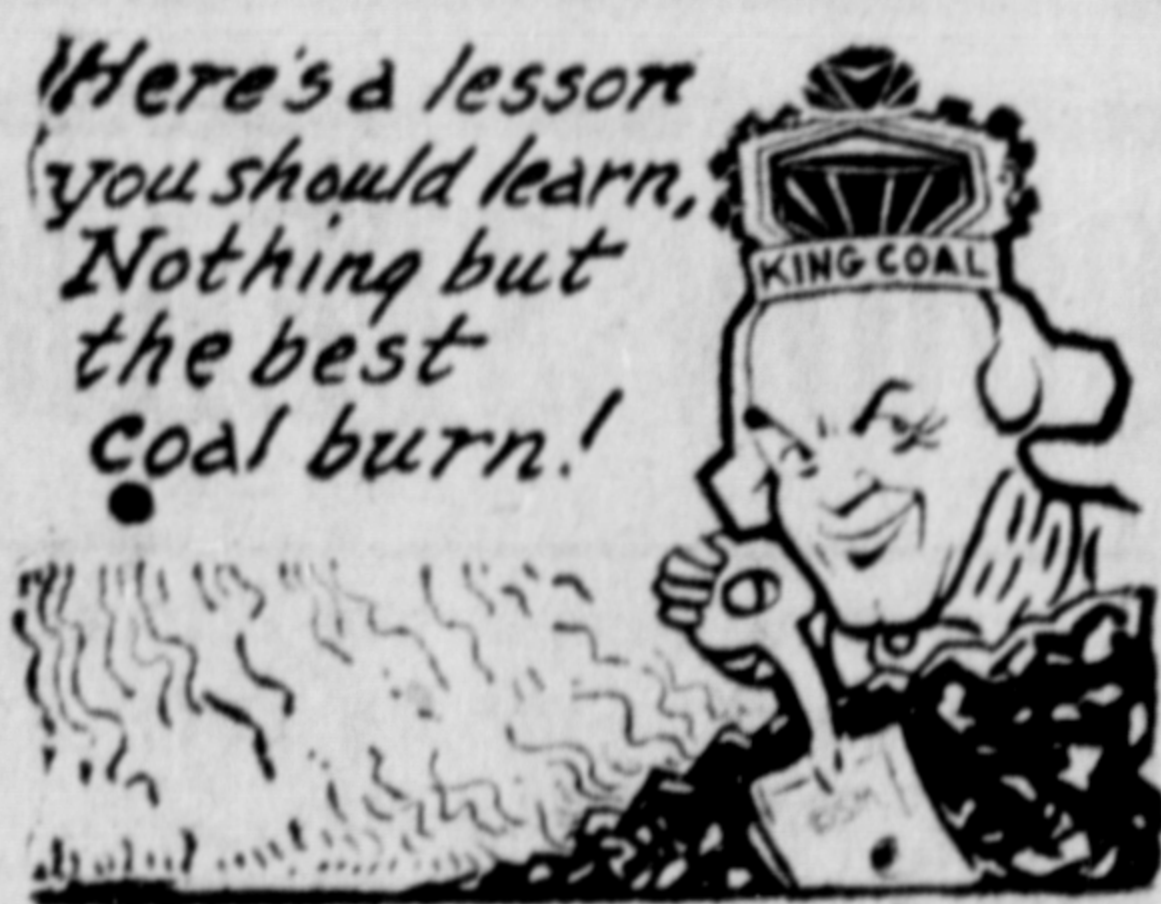
