CANADIAN FASCIST MOVEMENT

Evidently the Canadian Fascist Movement has made a start and is spreading. Adrien Arcand, editor of th new "I'Illustration Nouvelle," published in Montreal, is visionary with plenty of dynamic power such as is needed in a Fascist leader. He says that, by early summer, h will have an army of 20,000 men organized and drilled and he expects to see the movement expand to cover the whole of Canada and the United States. His army companies are known as "Blue Shirts" and their duty seems t be to put down radicalism.

The new tabloid newspaper is looked upon in the east as the mouthpiece of Premier Duplessis as well as being an advocate of Fascism. That links the Quebec Premier

up with the movement indirectly.

There is in Quebec a ban on communistic literature Gyro but no ban on Fascist literature. In addition to the tabloid newspaper, people are being supplied with copies of a INTEREST pamphlet "The Key to the Mystery," devoted chiefly to attacks on the Jews, and a monthly journal "Le Fasciste! Canadien." It is claimed that the Fascists are organized in seven of the larger cities of Ontario in addition to the! Quebec cities and that the movement is spreading very rapidly.

But they have preserved liberty up to now, because they have been willing, when absolutely necessary, to fight for it. Is it not possible that the apparent decline of liberty in the last ten years has been due to the fact that the free nations, exhausted and disillusioned by the Great War, have been seeking to convince themselves that liberty could be maintained without fighting, by leagues and regional pacts and covenants and economic sanctions and the 'outlawing' of war? It may not be absolutely necessary for the free nations to fight a MEN! To get vigor, vitality, try raw war in order to bring the decline of liberty to an end. But it is absolutely necessary for them to stop being afraid to fight one.'
