"In the death of Ramsay Mac-Donald, British statesmanship has sustained a serious loss," said Judge Jayakar. "Some day, when passions and prejudices have abated, history will accurately record the great services which he rerdered to England and India at the Round Table Conference.

"At its earliest stages, when the air was full of suspicions as regards the real intentions of England about the policy of the Round Table Conference, MacDonald earned the esteem and confidence of many prominent h ans and retained it throughout.

"Though friendly to India's aspirations, his powerlessness to go very far in meeting them was visible at every stage and, when the secrets behind the so-called communal award, so ingloriously connected with his name, are better known, they will reveal the same

"He was a true and unostentatious friend of India and Indians and remained so till the last."
