LONDON, June 14: (CP) -Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told the House of Commons today that Great Britain planned no retaliatory action because of the bombing of British shipping HUGE LAKE in the Mediterranean but was trying to work out a system of safety zones to end the attacks. "His Majesty's government has considered retaliatory action of various kinds but it is not prepared to embark on such mea-
