Penury to Great Power

Hectic Career

Spectacular Campaign At End Brought Ignominy and Defeat

PARIS, July 19.—(AP)—The late Samuel Insull, a true Napoleon of modern business, forced himself from penury to great power, lost his possessions, rallied for a final fight against criminal trials and went down to defeat after a spectacular campaign which attracted world attention. He died here Saturday and will be buried in London.
