Franco-German Friendship Pact Signed NINETEEN MEN LOSE THEIR LIVES AS CAGE PLUNGES

Recognition Of Existing Frontiers And Preservation Of Relations Of Good Neighborliness Are Pledged

TWO NATIONS AGREE TO CONSULT WITH EACH SACRIFICE OTHER ON ALL PROBLEMS WHICH MIGHT LEAD TO INTERNATIONAL DIFFICULTIES

PARIS, December 6: (CP)— A Franco-German pact, intended to prevent future wars between the two countries, was signed today by Georges Bonnet and Joachim von Ribbentrop, respective foreign ministers of the two nations. Germany formally renounces Alsace-Lorraine by agreeing to recognize existing frontiers. The pact recognizes peaceful relations and good neighborliness between France and Germany is essential to the maintenance of general

The countries agreed, under reservation of special relations with third powers, to remain in communication upon all questions interesting them and to mutually consult each other should problems arise leading to international difficulties.
