Frank Waterhouse Line Acquires Chilliwack by Charter-Salmon Catch Falls Off Somewhat

Announcement is made by Frank Waterhouse & Co. of Canada Ltd. that it has secured a long term charter of the large costal freighter Chilliwack which will be operated in the British Columbia-Puget Sound coasting trade on completion of her annual overhaul in a few days time. The Chilliwack, owned by the Union Steamships Ltd., is a vessel 200 feet long with 30-foot beam and can handle about 1,000 tons of deadweight cargo.
