HOMESPUNS ARE TOPS

Fashion Preview in London Shows Why Women Dress Well in English Materials

LONDON, May 12: (CP)—Fashions the world will see this summer at the Empire Exhibition in Glasgow were presented at a preview for the press in London a few days ago. In a golden-walled circular room of the luxurious Dorchester Hotel, mannequins paraded before fashion writers from London's papers and representatives of the Empire press.

The idea behind this display was not essentially to present new fashions but to show what could be done with materials as low in price as 25 cents a yard—from mills in the Midlands suffering from tremendous depression. This slump is due to the importation of foreign, particularly American, materials for cheap dresses.

Edward H. Symonds, organizer and producer of the fashion displays at Glasgow and director of the firm patronized for years by Queen Mary, gave a serious talk before the show began. He said frankly the British textile industry was facing an unprecedented crisis and employment of thousands of workers depended on the popularizing of British-made fabrics, not from the patriotic point of view but from that of beauty at low cost.

It was amazing to see how England's master dress designers in the parade that followed made dresses from materials priced at from 25 cents to \$2 a yard rival gold-threaded gowns of hand-woven fabrics from British Malaya costing \$75 a yard.

Lovely in Organdie

A debutante's court gown of porcelain white, two-toned, printed cotton organdie was one of the loveliest dresses shown, yet the material itself cost approximately 46 cents a yard retail. Ruffled and cut to perfection, it looked like the sheerest chiffon and is the first example made public of how British manufacturers have succeeded in duplicating a printing process hitherto a guarded secret of the Swiss.

The inevitable organdies for Ascot were shown to have acquired a new quality—they can be rained on and still retain their crispness. Prices per yard ran from 30 to 85 cents and colors favored were the new eclyan and a soft apple green. Hats worn with them were definitely bonnet, with a curled ostrich plume, or flat as pancakes with posies decorating the centre of the crowns. This group of dresses would be termed summer wedding or garden party in Canada.

Lancashire Velvet

A new venture brought into prominence at this show and greeted with applause even by the fashion-weary scribes, was the Lancashire woven cotton velvet. Soft as any continental variety, in luscious rich colorings, this material was most successfully used for a day-time ensemble of green military cloak and straight-lined, dress with a Cossack hat. The lining of the square shouldered dress length cloak and wide sash of the dress were in deep purple.

Another velvet evening gown in vivid lipstick scarlet was of the slinky, form-fitting trailing variety with very low crossed strap back.

Long colored gloves added glamour to the evening costumes. One pair were in gold with black at the under arm, another of geranium red and still others of purple worn with aquamarine blue.

Tonight's train, due from the East at 11 o'clock, was reported this morning to be running on time.

BUSINESS OF LEGION

Variety of Matters Taken Up at Regular Monthly Meeting Last Night

It is planned to hold the annual picnic to Digby Island on July 3. It is also planned to sponsor a football team in the city competitions.

Reports of a Legion rally held in Victoria and addressed by Colonel W. W. Foster, Dominion president of the Legion, the preceding banquet, and also a meeting of the provincial executive, were given by J. S. Wilson.
