## Former Railway Chief Dies

WINNIPEG, October 5: (CP)-Mr. Justice Charles Percy Fullerton, prominent for years in legal and railway spheres of the Dominion, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. C. McMillan, here at the age of sixty-eight. He had been ill since the beginning of June. Mr. Justice Fullerton was a former member of the Manitoba Court of Appeal and was a former chairman of the Board of Railway Commissioners. He was chairman of the board of trustees which controlled the destinies of the Canadian National Railways from 1933 until the Liberal government in 1935 restored the board of directors. The late Mr. Justice Fullerton was well known in Prince Rupert, having visited here both as chairman of the Board of Railway Commissioners and as chairman of the board of trustees of the Canadian National Railways.
