

MENDIP HILLS, Eng., June 22: (CP)—Captain Charles Baldwin pulled lustily while his rod bent double at Embrough fishing pond the other day. But there was no tugging. "An old boot," he thought with disgust.

When his catch broke water he saw it was a brand new rifle. A short while later he landed another. After he had brought a third firearm to the surface he decided to investigate. With the aid of grappling irons he recovered 47 more firearms including service revolvers, sportings guns, automatics and rifles.

Police are investigating. They found most of the firearms bore the date 1917 and they believe they were dumped by someone wishing to evade a police round-up of unlicensed firearms in 1925.
