In less than four years, Mr. Pitt put Big Bell into production, and with ore only carrying an average of \$6.97 in gold and a small silver content, produced \$650,000 in the first quarter of 1938, on a milling basis of approximately 1,000 tons of ore per day. It was another outstanding achievement for the engineer who made the famous Premier mine in this district.
