ALLEGE BOYCOTT BY SUPT. LOVE

Union Transfer Co. Claims That They Have Not Got a Square Deal Over the City Teaming.

Besides their letter demanding fulfillment of the coal contract, the Union Transfer Co. addressed a letter to the City Council last night protesting against the alleged boycotting of their firm by Mr. Love, superintendent of the Light department. The letter gives Mr. Love credit for succeeding "to a certain extent" in carrying out a threat to prevent any city teaming from coming to the Union Transfer Co.

The writer for the company makes his appeal with the sentence: "Knowing you gentlemen as I do to be all just and far-sighted to all matters pertaining to the management of the public utilities and not being of a patronizing nature," but goes on to say "of course we could mention innumerable instances where there has been partiality shown in the matter of the distribution of your public works. But being painful to ourselves, we shall not recall to memory any further of the injustices of this matter."

The letter was received and filed.

MURDER AND SUICIDE. Tragic Affair Has Occurred at Queen Charlotte City. The wireless station at 3 o'clock this afternoon received a message from Charlotte City on Graham Island to the effect that a shocking tragedy had occurred there this morning. A Chinaman resident there had murdered a young white girl, the daughter of a resident, and has committed suicide. The name of the Chinaman and the unfortunate girl victim were not given in the flash telling of the awful tragedy. DISTRIBUTOR WILL LEAVE. Is to Be Taken Apart and Rebuilt on the Thompson River. Captain Jackman, who arrived on the Prince Rupert this morning, has come to take the Distributor off the ship at Digby Island and take her to Vancouver. The well-known vessel has been sold by Foley, Welch & Stewart to Twohy Bros. of Spokane, who will have the vessel taken to pieces and sent to Kamloops, where she will work on the Thompson river in connection with their contract for the building of the Great Northern Railway.

With the passing of the Distributor there remains only one vessel at Digby Island of all the Foley-Welch fleet. WARNED STERNLY. Midnight Visitor Let Off Lightly Because of His Family. Magistrate Carss this morning read a very stern lecture to the midnight marauder, Ed. Strom, who broke a window at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Smith on Sixth Avenue on Xmas Eve. Accused, who has a wife and six children, was released with a nominal fine, promising good behavior. He has two lovely black eyes which he got as a sort of Xmas box from Smith when he tried to do the Santa Claus act through the glass pane.

WAS FLEECE BY LOAN SHARK. A Poor Woman in Chicago Paid \$450 Off a Loan of \$25, and Still Owed Nearly \$900 When Loan Agent Died. Chicago, Dec. 27.—For fifteen years Mrs. John H. Murphy made payments to a money lender trying to rid herself of a debt of \$25 incurred by her son. In that time she paid the loan agent more than \$450, and when the payments were finally stopped after his death she still owed nearly double the original amount. Mrs. Murphy struggled to get together money to make the monthly payments, and when she did not have it she renewed the notes. When the loan agent died a few days ago his son called at the Murphy home and demanded payment of the notes. Through the action of the Legal Aid Society the notes were canceled yesterday.
