Whifflets
From The Waterfront

C. N. R. steamer Prince John, Capt. George Coles, arrived in port at 1:30 this morning from Vancouver via Queen Charlotte Islands and will be here until 10:30 tomorrow night when she will sail on her return south over the same route.

Halibut landings at the port of Seattle for the 1938 season up to September 30 this year have totalled approximately 18,000,000 pounds which is just about the same figure at corresponding date last year. The price average this year has been slightly more than 8c per pound as compared with just over 9c last year.

The Dominion hydrographic survey ship William J. Stewart is at present engaged in taking soundings in and around Prince Rupert Harbor.

Three local boats sold small catches of halibut at Seattle on Tuesday, the fish having been taken incidental to cod fishing. The price paid at Seattle for halibut Tuesday was 14 1/2c and 14c per pound. Yesterday one local boat sold at Seattle the Lane receiving 15 1/2c for 1800 pounds of halibut, 4 1/2c for 14,500 pounds of sablefish, 3c for 2,500 pounds of ling cod and 4 1/2c for 2,000 pounds of red cod.

No vessels being in with catches there was no sale of halibut on the local Fish Exchange this morning.

According to word brought here by the American halibut boat Fremont, the schooner Tatoosh, which sank a few days ago in Wrangle Narrows south of Petersburg, has been dragged by salvage workers into shallower water and it is expected shortly to raise the vessel and take her into port. The Tatoosh was swept on to a dolphin by tidal current and struck such a blow that she sank almost immediately, the crew being just able to get to the dolphin to which they clung until picked up by another schooner, the Superior. The crew had another untoward experience while nearing Seattle aboard the steamer Columbia which was in collision with another ship, the Yukon.

BOYS ARE HONORED

Young Rangers Receive Medals for Putting Out Forest Fire

BURNS LAKE, Oct. 6.—Last Friday evening an interesting ceremony took place in the Anglican Church basement when five Young Rangers were awarded medals for "Service to the Forests of British Columbia." These were presented by the Burns Lake Board of Trade to Charles Nourse, Kenneth Gerow, Albert Gerow, David Gerow and Sammy Gerow for the part they played in attacking and controlling the Divide fire during the extreme fire hazard of the summer.

A large and representative gathering was present to do honor to these lads whose modesty was so great that persuasion was needed to get them to the front of the hall. Gordon Rush, Chief of the Burns Lake Band, took the chair at the request of the donors of the medals. He opened the meeting in the regular way with the Lord's Prayer and then gave a short address explaining the occasion for which the gathering was assembled. He then called on Marv Carroll, Chief of the Decker Lake Band, whose well presented speech showed careful preparation. She spoke of the value of the Babine Forest to this community and estimated the probable revenue of the immediate tract of timber endangered at \$500,000. She emphasized the fact that much wild life would have been destroyed and that the land would have lain waste for many years to come. She assured those present that the young people had the interests of the community at heart in their desire to preserve the forests and that no Young Ranger would ever, through carelessness or intention, start a fire in the forest.

Mr. Saunders spoke on behalf of

the members of the Board of Trade, thanking the boys for their prompt action and pointing out that it has been through the training and example of the young people in this part of the country that the fire menace has been largely eliminated.

Mr. Wilson followed with a short talk. He gave the size of his Ranger district and pointed out the impossibility for the Forest Service to do effective forest protection work without the co-operation of the entire community. He added that it had been his good fortune to have that co-operation of late years and that the Young Ranger movement had been a tremendous help along these lines. He compared the medal these Young Rangers were receiving with the Victoria Cross on which the sole inscription was "For Valour." He congratulated the boys and said that the words "For Service to the Forests of B. C." inscribed on their medals were the highest honor that could be paid them.

Gordon Rush then called on Mr. Ruddy to come forward and present the medals. The ceremony concluded with "God Save the King."
