MAGIC FONDANT CANDY

Coat with shredded coconut, chopped nut meats (toasted, when suitable), decorates; or garnish with nut meat halves, drained maraschino cherries (halves or slices), etc. Or use to stuff dates, prunes or figs. Chill on buttered pan or wax paper until fondant is firm. Candies may be chocolate-dipped, if desired. The ideal thing for party-sweets and gift boxes.
