HONG KONG, Oct. 18: (CP)-Forty-five miles from the coast, the first major battle in the new Japanese campaign against South China was in progress today with a large Chinese force now holding up the Nipponese expeditionary force which landed casualties have been reported as the Chinese massed huge numbers of soldiers in the attempt to withstand assaults of better equipped foemen.

The following is the copy of a circular letter which was sent a sister at Wellingbrough, England, of Mrs. G. H. Arnold of this city:

"This district has to receive ref-• ugee children from London. You will be required to afford accomodation at your house and are hereby directed to arrange necessary accomodation for their reception.
