Will See That Ex-Service Men are Employed on Federal Building

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

With a capacity list of 162 passengers, C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, was in port from 9 o'clock to 10:30 this morning northbound from Vancouver to Skagway. A good many of these passengers were for Alaska points and would ordinarily have gone north from Seattle on American boats had it not been for the ships being tied up in the Puget Sound port on account of strike. One passenger disembarked from the Princess Norah here while eighteen took passage aboard her for the north including a local bowling party of eight for Ketchikan.

An interesting visitor to port is the handsome and speedy Royal Canadian Air Force runabout M172 which came north from Vancouver at the first of the week with squadron leader T. E. Stevenson and party on board. The party is carrying out defence survey work in this district in continuation of what was started last year. The M172 is at the Armour Salvage Co. floats.

With coal and other local cargo the freighter Salvor, Capt. Alber Georgeson, arrived in port at 1 o'clock last night from the south and was discharging this morning at the Philpott-Evitt dock.

Timely Recipes

Indian Pudding
 By combining milk with a cereal that is rich in starch, a nourishing dessert is made. Many cereals are suitable for puddings.

One-third cup cornmeal, 4 cups milk, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1 tea spoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 cup molasses.

Heat milk in double boiler. Whisk in cornmeal with a fork and cook for 20 minutes, stirring until mixture thickens. Add molasses, salt, and spices. Pour into buttered baking dish. Place in pan of hot water and bake in moderate oven about one hour, or until set.

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
