TOURIST BUREAU

Information Office To Be Opened For Balance of Season

A meeting of the directors of the recently formed Tourist Information Bureau was held yesterday afternoon in City Commissioner Alder's office and it was decided to open a tourist information office for the balance of the tourist season. The city is providing a vacant store for this purpose on Second avenue east of Sixth street.

At the meeting W. J. Alder was elected president of the bureau and T. J. Williams, secretary-treasurer. Representations were made recently to Hon. W. J. Asselstine, minister of trades and industry, for a grant towards financing the operation of the bureau and a letter was read at the meeting stating that the government had demonstrated its interest in the project by contributing \$200 towards its expenses. Other correspondence from the tourist bureau of the department indicated that the government wished to co-operate in every possible way with the local organization which it is planned will become in time a centre of tourist information for the entire north country.
