Library Shows Increased Use

Number of Borrowers is Up As Well As Circulation

The Prince Rupert Library Board held its regular monthly meeting last night at the library. Those present were Frank Dibb, chairman, T. B. Black, secretary, Mrs. Norah Arnold, R. E. Moore and Miss Olive van Cooten, librarian.

The circulation for the month of February showed an increase over that of January, the figures being: fiction, 1813, non-fiction, 384; juvenile, 748; pay, 440; total 3,385.

An increase in borrowers is also evident. Figures show that eighty members joined the library in the month of January and February.

The board was informed by the librarian that telephone directories covering principle cities throughout Canada are now available in the reading room.
