Southbound from Alaska to Vancouver after a special cruise voyage which included calls at Sitka and certain other points of interest not included on the regular schedules, C.P.R. steamer Princess Charlotte, Capt. William Palmer, arrived in port at 8 o'clock this morning and was here until 12:30 noon. The Princess Charlotte had a capacity list of 222 aourist passengers of whom two disembarked here.

Bringing in a full list of passengers, consisting largely of tourists, C.N.R. steamer Prince Charles, Capt. James Watt, arrived in port at 11:15 this morning from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands and will sail at 10:30 Saturday night on her return south over the same route. Most of the tourists who arrived on the Prince Charles will transfer tomorrow to the steamer Prince George to make the trip to Anyox and Stewart and return to Vancouver. The Prince George tomorrow will be bringing in tourists who will transfer to the Prince Charles Saturday evening to return south via the Queen Charlotte Islands after making the run to Anyox and Stewart. Coming north this voyage, the Prince Charles was the first vessel to call at the new B.C. Packers wharf at Pacofi.
