EARTHQUAKE FLOODS AND HURRICANE

Story of Elements is Visited Upon Japan and Hundreds Perish—Tokyo Inundated and Isolated

TOKYO, June 30: (CP)—There have been heavy rains of cloud-burst proportions with serious floods in Japan. Even in Tokyo homes have been inundated and the city is virtually isolated. The deluge was the heaviest in Japan's history. In the wake of the two days' flood horror in which one hundred were killed and 200 others are missing, a typhoon howled today towards Japan's islands. An earthquake also levelled homes and disrupted rail and wire communications.

Former President Is In Vancouver

Hoover Arrives in British Columbia For Two Weeks' Fishing Trip

VANCOUVER, June 30: (CP)—Former President Herbert Hoover of the United States arrived in Vancouver today from Seattle for a two weeks' fishing trip to British Columbia. He is accompanied by Arthur Mastick Hyde, his former Secretary of Agriculture, and Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, his former secretary of the interior.

DEFICIT IS DOWN

Lowest Since Roosevelt Administration Took Office—Some Staggering Figures Here

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 30:—United States government revenues for the past fiscal year were the highest since 1933 and the net deficit was the lowest since the Roosevelt administration took office, unofficial, preliminary figures show.

The national debt now stands at \$37,124,000,000. Public expenditures for the year were \$7,530,000,000 with revenue of \$6,190,000,000, leaving a net deficit of \$1,342,000,000. This deficit compares with \$2,666,000,000 in the year previous.

Even heavier expenditures are anticipated during the coming year but the hope is that increased revenues may help to keep the national debt from increasing to over the forty billion dollar mark.

Loan of Five Million Dollars Is Being Floated to Finance Building Program

KINGSTON, Jamaica, June 30.—The government of Jamaica is floating a \$5,000,000 loan to help finance a public works program including construction of roads, schools and other buildings. Duties on wines and spirits will be increased to provide further funds for the public works.

LET NOT RUNNING
AWA—Rt. Hon. E. B. Bennett discloses that he has no desire to succeed himself as Conservative leader. He told the Canadian Press that he would not be a candidate for the leadership to be filled at the national Conservative convention here next week. Hon. H. H. Stevens, Reconstruction member for Kootenay East, announced that he would attend the convention as delegate for Maisonneuve-Rosemont, Montreal, after a meeting there last night named him as delegate.

NAVAL AGREEMENT
LONDON — Agreement among Great Britain, United States and France setting the limit on battleships at 45,000 tons with sixteen-inch guns was announced in the House of Commons by Alfred Duff-Cooper, First Lord of the Admiralty. He said that the limit was higher than Britain wanted to go but it was the "lowest on which agreement could be reached."

APPEAL OF POPE
CASTEL GANDOLFO, Italy — The Vatican News Service said that Pope Pius had appealed to the Japanese government to "spare civilian population insofar as possible" in conducting aerial bombardments of China.

MOODY-JACOBS WIN
WIMBLEDON — Helen Wills Moody and Helen Jacobs, both on the comeback trail, qualified for renewal of their famous tennis duels today when they advanced to the finals of the All England championships. Mrs. Moody defeated Hilda Sperling of Germany 12-10, 6-4 after Miss Jacobs beat Alice Marble of United States 6-4, 6-4.

ELECTION REFORMS

Act Amended So As To Ensure Against Premature Announcement of Results

OTTAWA, June 30: (CP)—Western Canada electors will vote at the next general election in ignorance of the election trend in Eastern Canada under provisions of the new Election Franchise Act, which passed its third reading in the House of Commons yesterday. It is made an offence punishable with a fine not exceeding \$500 or a year's imprisonment or both for anyone publishing or broadcasting election results from any part of Canada in any province before the polls close in that province.

The House defeated two alternatives—one to stagger voting hours across the country and the other that ballot boxes in the East should not be opened until all the polls in the country are closed.

New York Stock Mart Is Mounting

NEW YORK, June 30: (CP)—The industrial average in yesterday's trading on the New York Stock Exchange was the highest since last November.

Police Court Fines Are Up This Year

Police court fines in the city for the month of May this year totalled \$440 as compared with \$340 in the same month last year. So far this year fines have amounted to \$1307 in comparison with \$1203 for the first six months of 1937.

FIRES ARE NUMEROUS

Situation Continues Hazardous In Many Parts of Province—More This Year Than Last

VICTORIA, June 30: (CP)—The forest fire situation continues serious in a good many portions of the province as hot, dry weather continues. Eighty-eight fires are now reported burning. Last week alone 100 new fires were reported but quite a number of these are now out. So far this year there have been 675 fires in the province as compared with 415 at a similar date last year and 444 in 1936.

SHIPS SOON TO BE SAFE

This Is Hope of London With Establishment of Free Port

LONDON, June 30: (CP)—London is hopeful that an early cessation of Spanish insurgent attacks on British ships will be brought about through the establishment of a neutral port through which commodities other than those used in actual warfare may have free passage.

Reports from Hendaye today as to the progress of the civil war stated that the insurgents had pierced the government's main line defenses at two places before Valencia in a powerful offensive through the foothills of the Sierra de Espadan Range.

Two British destroyers have been ordered from Gibraltar to the Balearic Islands.

Figures For Month of May Are Made Public Today at City Hall

Although there are no more on relief in the city today than there were a year ago, relief costs to the city are higher owing to the municipalities now having to pay the entire cost of relief for unemployed. The total net cost of relief to the city for May this year was \$951.95 as compared with \$608.60 in the same month last year.

The following figures on relief payments for May were made public at the City Hall this morning: non-employables, \$503.15; families, cost of which is shared by the governments and the city, \$1477.25; single men, employable, \$132.70; single homeless men, \$565.35; single homeless women, \$22; single Chinese, \$35.70.

The city's share covering relief recipients to which the governments' contribution is \$448.50 which, added to the \$503.15 for unemployed, makes the total \$951.95.

JOBLESS REGISTER

Single Unemployed Men Now In Victoria Are Listing Themselves With Employment Service

VICTORIA, June 30: (CP)—Five hundred single unemployed men, following their trek here from Vancouver to stage a demonstration in demand for a works program, have agreed to register with the Employment Service of Canada.

All those from outside of British Columbia, it has been announced by the provincial government, will after registering, be provided with temporary relief pending the making of arrangements for transportation back to their homes.

There will be no relief for bona-fide British Columbia residents as it is the feeling of the government that these should be able to obtain employment in the industries of the province.

MAKING OF MUNITIONS

Survey of Canadian National Shops Already On—Minister Hopes Some Business May Be Available

OTTAWA, June 30: (CP)—The survey to determine the availability and suitability of Canadian National Railway shops to turn out munitions, tanks and other war supplies has already commenced, Hon. Ian Mackenzie, said. The minister of National defense did not wish to create false hopes for Canadian National employees, many of whom had been laid off recently, but, if the needed supplies could be turned out in these shops, they should be.

The Canadian Press learned that there were not enough Canadian orders in prospect to keep any considerable number of Canadian National workers busy even if the shops were suitable but it learned that consideration was being given to placing possible British arms orders with the Canadian system.
