To Chinese Bombers Drop Leaflets Instead of Bombs on Nipponese Islands

HANKOW, May 20 (CP) -Crews of two big Chinese bombers were given a great welcome today on their return from what Chinese aviation headquarters described as a 2500-mile flight over Western Japan, dropping leaflets urging Japanese to oppose the invasion of China and withdraw while they could still do so grace-

SHANGHAI, May 20 .- The Japanese claim that the capture of Suchow, Lunghai Railway centre, is of vital strategic importance in their Chinese campaign. The Chinese, on the other hand, say the loss of the city will have little effect upon them, particularly since they lost none of their fighting forces which had been withdrawn in an orderly manner on the place being
