### Prince Kupert General Kospital Association

ISSUE OF \$20,000.00 5% BONDS, DUE 1958

The Prince Rupert General Hospital Association has invited tenders for the erection of a complete and fully modern 50 bed hospital of concrete construction, to be erected on the site adjoining the present hospital. These tenders are to be in the hands of the Hospital authorities not later than April 9th next and it is expected the relative contract will be awarded soon thereafter.

The estimated cost of the building, as supplied by the Provincial Architect, will be \$100,000.00 of which amount the Provincial Government has voluntarily contributed \$50,000.00 on the understanding that the Hospital Association would provide the balance. For this purpose the Association has in hand \$30,000.00 and in order to provide the balance of \$20,000,00 a bond issue will be offered to the public.

The bonds will be of \$100.00 denomination, payable in twenty years and bearing interest at the rate of 5 percent per annum, payable semi-annually, and will be subject to call for payment, in whole or in part, after a period of five years. As direct security the Association proposes placing twenty y ar endowment life insurance for the full amount of the issue.

In issuing these bonds in small denominations, the Association has in mind the fact that many residents of moderate means, both in the city and district, will be desirous of investing therein, and it is to these friends that the desired appeal is made in order that they might have a direct interest in their hospital.

Although the bonds may be purchased as an undoubtedly favourable investment, it is the sincere hope of the Association that all friends who feel financially able will make a direct contribution to the project.

It will be of interest to all and particularly to the investors to know that the new building, although of immediate 50 bed capacity, will be so constructed that upon an estimated further outlay, in due course, of \$25,000.00 for fully completing the ground floor, an additional 25 beds would be made available, thereby providing a 75 bed building.

#### Timely Recipes

FISH LOAF Many fish cookery recipes are very simple, calling for fish and little else, but Canadian fish foods llend themselves to numerous variningham, Port Essington; Mrs. Jor- ations in treatment and one of the cookery demonstrators on the staff of the Dominion Department of Fisheries suggests a "fish loaf" which may be new to a good many housewives. "In making this fish loaf," the demonstrator said, "a tablespoon! of flour is first added to a tablespoon of melted butter and the two are cooked together for a minute; then one cup of hot milk is added while the mixture is stirred constantly. Next I put in sufficient. salt and pepper to suit the taste and after that comes the addition I of two cups of cooked fish, two beaten eggs, one cup of bread crumbs, one chopped hard boiled egg, two chopped pickles, and

three tablespoons of parsley.
