Four Hundred Killed and Wounded When one Hundred Japanese Bombing Planes Strike

HANKOW, August 13: (CP)-One hundred Japanese war planes bombed Hankow yesterday. Four hundred persons, the large majority civilians including women and children, were killed or wounded.

Railway yards and buildings were the chief objective of the attack. There were no Chinese planes returning the combat and anti-aircraft fire was quite ineffective.

VICTORIA, Aug. 13: (CP) - Brition of the Canadian Weekly News- was accepted. It was shown that Terrace-Cloudy, calm, tempera- tish Columbia recently celebrated the 80th anniversary of its christening. In 1858 the name was chosen by Queen Victoria who, in a lletter to Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton, colonial secretary, suggested the west coast province of Canada be named British Columbia.
