APPEALS TO LONDON

Evidently this matter of appealing to the Privy Council from decisions of the Supreme Court of Canada is not to be made a party question. The motion to abolish appeals to London is introduced by one of the Conservative leaders and backed by one of the Liberal leaders. The Social Credit group oppose it because they disagree with the recent judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada and are hoping that the committee of the law lords of the Privy Council will reverse that decision.

The appeals to the Privy Council seem to be scarcely in accord with the general trend of Canadian affairs. Canadian judges should be as well able to interpret the Canadian constitution as British judges. It is certain they are in a better position to understand Canada and her problems than are the privy councillors in London. It is time Canada cut loose in this matter. It costs a lot of money to take cases to the Privy Council and we have seen no particular case in the past quarter of a century in which any benefit has been derived from the practice.

IS THERE A BREAK?

It begins to look as if there was a coolness developing between Premier Mussolini and Adolph Hitler. The British government is said to be making progress in formulating a treaty with Italy which will pave the way to a better understanding while Germany is finding that her alliance with Japan is not adding much to her prestige. Premier Chamberlain seems confident that he has averted war for the present and, in the meantime, he is keeping the factories busy making war material so that, if the country should be called upon to fight, she may not be taken at a disadvantage.

WHY NOT A DUEL

It seems rather a pity that the Liberal party could not stand aside in the contest in Dewdney and let the Conservatives and the C.C.F. fight it out among themselves for the leadership of the Opposition. The Liberals have little to gain by contesting the seat. If they win they still will be no stronger than they are today. If they lose, their prestige is injured. To withdraw the Liberal candidate would show a sporting spirit which would be appreciated by many people of all shades of political faith.

The difficulty in this case may be that, since D. W. Strachan has been nominated by the Liberals, it is up to him whether he will withdraw. Also the wishes of his supporters have to be considered. The probability is that there will be a three-cornered fight and no candidate will obtain a majority of the votes.

CHICAGO GOES UP

Black Hawks Now Leading Again
In Stanley Cup Series With 2
To 1 Victory Over Toronto

CHICAGO, April 11: (CP)—Chicago Black Hawks came up from behind last night to beat the favored Toronto Maple Leafs two to one in the third game of the Stanley Cup final series. Doc Romnes, who broke his nose in the second game on Thursday night, fired in the winning goal late in the third period. The Leafs roared a futile protest that the puck had struck the post and actually did not go in to the net. It was a hard drive from thirty feet out which slipped past Turk Broda.

Early in the first period, Syl Apps made the one and only counter for Toronto. Voss evened up the count for Chicago in the second period.

Eighteen thousand fans witnessed the game which was played in Chicago Arena.

The fourth game will be played here Thursday. A win for the Hawks will give them the Stanley Cup and the world's professional hockey championship. A Toronto win would tie the series up again and necessitate the fifth and deciding game at Toronto Saturday night.
