SKEENA CROSSING, April 18.—The death occurred recently of Kenneth Wesley, the nine-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Matthias S. Wesley of Kitzequcla. The passing of little Kenneth was deeply mourned not only by the parents and close relatives but by the whole community. He was an active member of the Sunday School and the Band of Hope connected with the United Church.

Funeral services were held in the United Church. Prior to the service in the church a brief service was conducted in the home by Peter Mark, Honorary President of the Epworth League. ### GREAT SHOW IN GLASGOW

Fifteen Million Visitors Expected at Empire Exhibition—Rushing Buildings Now

GLASGOW, April 18: (CP)—Three thousand workmen are rushing work on the site of the Empire Exhibition near this Scottish seaport this summer. One hundred buildings have sprung up mushroom-like and foundations and gardens are now being prepared.

It will be the greatest exhibition in the British Isles since the Wembley Exposition of 1924.

The show will be on for six months and it is estimated there will be fifteen million visitors including thousands from the Dominions and the colonies.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, arrived in port at 6 o'clock last evening from the south and sailed at 8 p.m. for Port Simpson, Stewart and other northern points whence she is due back here tomorrow morning southbound. The vessel had on board a fair-sized list of passengers.

Salmon landings have been fairly light at Ketchikan of late and prices have been quite good, running as high as 14c and 10c with the general average 13c and 8c. Halibut prices at Ketchikan Saturday were 6c and 4c and 6.5c and 4c. Some small boats were in the largest halibut catch landed here being 9,500 pounds.

C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, completing her final voyage of the winter and spring schedule on the Alaska route, is due in port at 3:45 this afternoon from the north and will sail at 5 p.m. for Vancouver. The Princess Louise will take over the run with the next sailing to Skagway.

Capt. W. P. Armour and W. O. Tilton left at 6:30 last evening on the Pachena for Ketchikan to spend today there, returning tonight or tomorrow morning. Capt. Armour has gone to Ketchikan to meet his brother, Fred Doran of Seattle, formerly a chief engineer on Alaska boats and now located at Seattle as a port engineer. Mr. Doran is on a tour of Alaska just now.
