MUNICIPAL ELECTION

NOMINATION NOTICE.

Public notice is hereby given to the electors of the Municipality of Prince Rupert that I require the presence of the said electors at the City Hall on Monday, the 8th day of January, 1913, at 12 o'clock noon, for the purpose of electing persons to represent them in the Municipal Council as Aldermen and Aldermen.

The mode of nomination of candidates shall be as follows:—The candidates shall be nominated in writing, the writing shall be subscribed by two voters of the Municipality as proposers and seconders, and shall be delivered to the Returning Officer at any time between the date of this notice and 2 p. m. of the day of nomination, and in the event of a poll being necessary, such poll will be held on the 14th day of January, 1913, at the City Hall, Third Avenue, between the hours of 9 a. m. and 7 p. m., of which every person is hereby required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Qualifications for Mayor.

Persons qualified to be nominated for and elected as Mayor of the City of Prince Rupert shall be male British subjects of the full age of 21 years, and are not disqualified under any law, and have been for the six months next preceding the day of nomination, the registered owner in the Land Registry Office of land or real property, or who is the holder of an equity or interest in real property in the City of Prince Rupert of the assessed value of \$1,000.00 or more, and whose name appears on the last Municipal Assessment Roll as such owner.

Qualifications for Aldermen.

Persons qualified to be nominated for and elected as Aldermen shall be male British subjects of the full age of 21 years, and are not disqualified under any law, and have been for the six months next preceding the day of nomination, the registered owner in the Land Registry Office of land or real property, or the holder of an equity or interest in real property in the City of Prince Rupert of the assessed value of \$500.00 or more, and whose name appears on the last Municipal Assessment Roll as such owner.

COLD SNAP OVER THE CONTINENT

It is 15 Below Zero in Chicago—All the Great Cities Are Suffering Intensely from the Cold Weather.

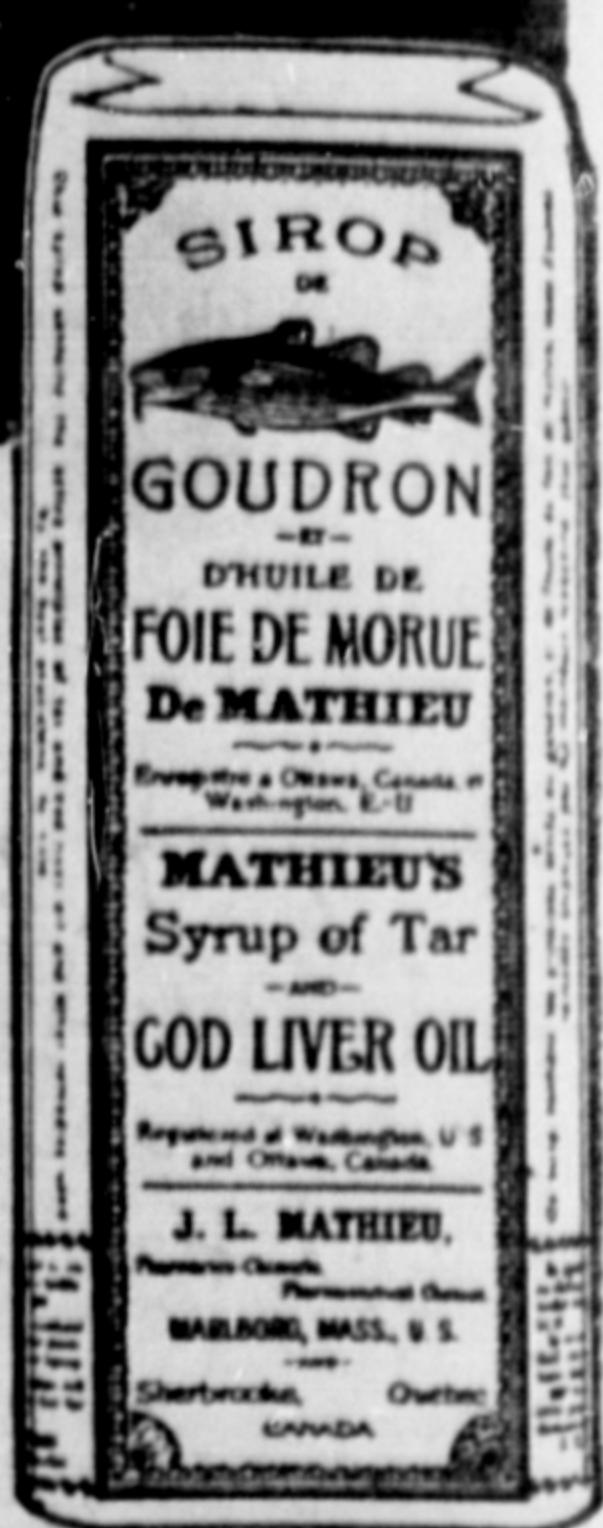
