AUSTRALIAN LEADER WANTS GIRLS TO PUNCH DOUGH, NOT TYPEWRITERS

Australian Press Bureau. HOBART, Australia, Sept. 8.—Deploping his inability to find money for the erection of a technical college for girls, the Minister of Education E. J. Ogilvie expressed regret that two-thirds of the pupils of New Town Commercial High School were learning to punch typewriters instead of dough.

Addressing the council of the Parents and Friends' Association he said that technical education for girls was even more important than for boys.

"I would rather know that a girl's relation of mine ranked high in domestic science than in such subjects as trigonometry and decimals, which will be no use to her in later life," said Mr. Ogilvie. "I would like to see her education directed towards a balanced diet to enable her to attack problems of the kitchen."

"If our girls were so taught and were educated also in such accomplishments as singing, music, elocution, or art, the community would be much better off."

Proxy Bride Refuses To Accept Husband

(Australian Press Bureau) FREMANTLE, Australia, Sept. 8.—A 25-year-old Italian bride, who reached Fremantle from Italy, has caused consternation by her refusal to accept her husband, whom she married by proxy.

The woman and her husband, a 29-year-old fisherman, were to have visited the church on the day of her arrival for the religious part of their wedding ceremony, but the arrangements were cancelled.

Friends of the bridegroom and relatives of the bride, have sought a way out, but the woman has been adamant, despite the fact that her proxy husband paid her fare to Australia.

The couple are legally married, and will remain so unless annulment proceedings are successful. Some Italians, long resident in the State, consider that there should be some tightening up in the facilities for proxy marriages.

In the present instance, the bride had never seen her future husband until she reached Fremantle, the marriage having, it is stated, been arranged between his parents and her parents, who reside in Italy.
