Letters to the Editor

To the Editor of The News:
Dear Sir—In your paper of Jan. 6th you gave publication in large headlines to the effect that I have decided to resign from the services of the council, also make the statement that I am disgusted with the mismanagement and hampering of the council. No such statement was made by me, in fact no statement was made at all for publication.
One of your reporters approached me on Saturday morning and I told him that I had no statement to make till I had interviewed the mayor and chairman of the light and telephone committee, and we engaged in ordinary conversation.
I never said I was dissatisfied with losing the light plant, on the other hand the Council is perfectly at liberty to make what changes it may see fit, but I said I certainly could not consider \$460. The report also says the telephone department is taxed to the capacity of the cables and cannot grant any more extensions of service urgently demanded because the present Council so mismanaged affairs that they could not grant me the switchboard I asked for months ago. What I did say was this: There will have to be considerable cable put in this year as the present cables are getting pretty well filled up. That alone will make considerable work and will keep me quite busy. We also will require a new section of switchboard in order to meet next year's business. I applied for this board last year, but there was not sufficient funds to purchase and it had been laid over to next year with a recom-

mendation to purchase at once. I also wish to say in closing the conversation I had with your reporter was just a personal conversation, which he was not at liberty to use and which he misinterpreted. All my dealings with the Mayor and Chairman of the light and telephone committee in connection with dividing the departments were carried out in a friendly and gentlemanly manner, and to the satisfaction of all parties concerned, and moreover my resignation was not handed in. commissioner over the heads of previous applicants who had been told there would be no bottle licenses granted. The evil was aggravated, he declared, by the fact that to create an appearance of fair play two bottle licenses had been issued, but in reality the two were one. "If elected mayor," declared Alderman Newton, "I would take steps at once to issue a third bottle license to break that monopoly. (Cheers.)"

Protecting Little Willie.

Referring to the efforts he had made to secure better fire protection for the city, Alderman Newton declared that the whole of his colleagues in Council had gone against his plan for the early completion of Acropolis Hill reservoir, "lest it should prejudice Mr. Manson's position at Victoria."

On the hydro-electric proposition he remarked that if the citizens wanted their \$550,000 spent by "schemers," as Alderman Hilditch himself called them, they had better vote for Hilditch. (Cheers.)

A Convert to Extra Hour.

To G. R. Naden's question on the subject of the extra hotel bar hour on week days, Alderman Newton replied that while he had strongly opposed the granting of the extra hour a year ago he did not see any reason now for interfering with what had been passed and granted.

"But," he added violently, "if the hotel-men subscribe \$1,000 to beat me out, don't you think I'll soak it to them to make them keep the law if I am elected?" (Loud applause.) He said that he had faith enough in the McBride government to think that he would be given the appointment of the two other licence commissioners if elected mayor.

Forty-Five Cent Wage

On the 45 cent rate, in answer to Charlie Hunter's question, Ald. Newton said that he would place the 45 cent rate on the statute book as the minimum in place of the 37 1/2 cent as at present. (Cheers from the labor men.)

J. G. Scott Retaliates

Ald. Newton had just disposed of the answer to Charlie Hunter's question on the 45-cent rate and the applause was dying down, when interruption of a different character broke out.

From the back of the hall J. G. Scott demanded that Ald. Newton produce proof instantly of the charges he had made that any one wanting a job must buy his hardware from the Kaien Hardware store.

Ald. Newton said that it was common talk on the streets. "You say that it is common talk on the streets," he said. "What proof have you that it is true? Before I or any decent man would repeat such gossip we would have proof of its truth, and you are a mean cowardly cur to make such statements on the public platform."

"You show yourself a clever follower of Ald. Hilditch to copy his language so well," returned Ald. Newton. "I repeat what I said that it is common knowledge and talk in the city that the case is as I stated."

George Tite's Offer

Here George Tite sprang into the arena. "I deny," he said, "that any man has ever been influenced to purchase his furnishings from me. I will give \$25,000 to any man in this hall or in Prince Rupert who can prove to the contrary."

"Oh," said Ald. Newton, "I have no doubt at all that it cannot be proved. Members of the ring that has sought to rule this city are clever enough to see to it that there is no proof, but it is common talk just the same, and more—there is a man, a furniture dealer in this town who was led to believe he would have the furnishing of a certain hotel. He was turned down by the ring and the goods are still on his hands." (Some applause.)
