Ottawa Visitors Seek Sensations

Thousands Visit Capital in Summer and Ask Many Questions

OTTAWA, Sept. 22: (CP)—As early as 8:30 on a summer morning eager sightseers arrive at the Parliament Buildings' centre block waiting to tour the \$13,000,000 gothic structure where Canada's laws are made.

Nearly 70,000 holidayers listed the capital city on their itineraries in July and August this year, making a point of viewing the House of Commons, the Senate Chamber, the parliamentary library, the memorial chamber and the Peace Tower. This number fell short of the visitors in the same period a year ago by 10,000. Apart from Canadians the visitors are largely from the United States, but official books record signatures of summer visitors from many European countries.

So a busy day begins for the five official guides, who at nine o'clock each morning gather their charges around like so many chicks and begin a tour of the centre block with a running commentary which lasts 45 minutes. From five to 10 miles are traversed by each guide in his trips that range from 10 to 30 daily in the holiday season. During the session these officers are guards at the entrances to the House of Commons and the Senate.

Although the four floors allotted as members' sessional offices are undisturbed while the House is not sitting, the marble corridors on the first two floors are ever filled with the sound of shuffling feet and the chatter of enthusiastic sightseers.

"Show me some place like where Mary, Queen of Scots, was beheaded?" asked a breathless visitor one day, who had a few minutes for "looking" between trains. The guide tactfully explained no such gory undertakings were on record in these parts.

"Where does Mitch Hepburn sit?" inquired another spectator who was not satisfied with seeing the prime minister's place and the thrones of the governor-general and the speakers of the Commons and Senate. He was surprised to learn Mr. Hepburn had moved the
