A BLOW FOR THE CEMENT COMBINE.

Although Manitoba is a Conservative province, and its capital, Winnipeg, went against reciprocity at the recent Federal election, the people there, when it comes down to spending their own money, want to get all they can for it. They have recently been very much excited over the price of cement. Cement in Canada is protected by a duty of 80 cents a barrel, the cement industry being an infant industry—a poor, struggling creature puling and muling in the arms of its nursemaid, the thirteen-million dollar combine which Max Aitken recently floated.

Last week the Winnipeg City Council asked for tenders for 25,000 barrels of cement, to be delivered for use during 1912. It looked like a cinch for the cement merger, who have pretty well stifled competition. Only one tender, that from the merger, came from all Canada. It demanded \$2.14 3/4 per barrel of 350 pounds. This was a cut from the price of \$2.24 obtained the previous year, and was supposed to be because an American firm was tendering, too. When the tender of the American firm—the Lehigh Portland Cement Co.—was opened it was found that their price was \$2.10 per barrel of 350 pounds. This was despite the duty of 80 cents per barrel that their product will have to pay.

Of course, according to Conservative economic philosophy, it is a very wrong thing to buy from the Lehigh Company for \$2.10 when you can get it from the Canada Cement Merger for \$2.14 3/4, even when you give the government 80 cents of the price. It is unpatriotic. It is a hardship on the poor millionaires of the Cement Trust, and the empire is doomed if we do not pay fancy prices to the plutocrats who rig the tariff.

But in spite of all that, there are a good many Conservatives in Winnipeg and elsewhere who are paying 80 cents a barrel too much for their cement in order to pay dividends to cement plutocrats on watered stock, who feel like imitating their young sons and calling out, "Stung!" to the Canada Cement Company.

INVESTIGATE THE DYNAMITE AFFAIR.

In the excitement of the municipal elections the civic authorities must not lose sight of the necessity to thoroughly investigate the matter of the three hundred pounds of dynamite left lying in a manure heap near Morse Creek last week.

Familiarity breeds contempt. The three years of blasting 'out a city on the rocky slopes of Kaien Island have made all of us too contemptuous of the dangers of dynamite. Sticks of it have been picked up by children, one piece of it, indeed, close to the school yard. Time and again citizens have undergone narrow escapes from injury. The Morse Creek affair, when a workman drove his steel spade clean through the sack of dynamite before he discovered the stuff, caps the long list of miraculous escapes the city has known.

A very searching investigation is required, and heavy penalty should be placed on the party or parties who were responsible for the criminally negligent act of placing a sack of dynamite in a manure pile, close to where many people reside, without taking precautions to advise people of the presence of the high explosive.
