### TRADE WITH UNITED STATES

As a result of the business recession in the United States, the market for Canadian goods in that country fell off tremendously and this accounted very largely for the slight recession in this country. For the first nine months of this year the commodities exported to the United States were valued at \$219,000,000 whereas in the similar months of the previous year the total value was \$369,000,000. Whiskey alone was responsible for a drop of between six and seven million dollars; softwood lumber about three millions, wood pulp more than ten millions, newsprint about seventeen millions and asbestos a million dollars.

Nobody seems to know anything about what goods are affected by the proposed new trade agreement. The old one is particularly advantageous to British Columbia including the Prince Rupert district. During the nine months we exported to United States about eight million dollars worth of wood for pulp purposes, which is about the same as for the same period of the previous year. Objection has been taken to this export of raw materials but the cutting of pulpwood for export seems to be a very considerable industry in the east and objection is taken to making any change.

### IS IT THE BEST SYSTEM?

Many people are beginning to wonder if the present system of government under which the business of the opposition is always to oppose and criticise the government is in the best interests of the country. In the recent crisis we saw the leader of the Conservative party in Canada in consultation with the Prime Minister and withholding all criticism of what he might have considered to be the slowness of the administration in stating how it stood. Although pressed by many of his supporters to make a statement of his position with a view to embarrassing the government he refused to speak until the government had spoken, thus preventing the European countries from getting the idea that Canada was divided on this matter.

Right Hon. Anthony Eden, former Secretary of state for foreign affairs in Great Britain, favors a government for that country representing all classes and groups but failing that, he suggests frequent conferences between government and opposition leaders with a view to formulating a defence and foreign policy that is representative of the whole British people. As Ramsay MacDonald once said: "Parliament should be a council of state" on all important matters.

### LEGLESS SPORTSMAN TRAVELS 6,000 MILES FOR DERBY



Sir Abe Bailey did not lose any of his enthusiasm for living when it was necessary to amputate both his legs because of plebitis (inflammation of the legs) and for the 103rd time made the 6,000-mile journey from South Africa to England. His special mission was to see his horse, Golden Sovereign, run in the Derby, and he made the trip against his physician's orders. He lost both legs within the past year, five months apart, from recurring attacks of the disease.

### SPORT CHAT

Dutch Hiller is heading for his first full season in the National Hockey League but the chunky 23-year-old Kitchener, Ontario, boy doesn't show the enthusiasm one would expect. "The novelty's worn off," soft-spoken Dutch remarked. "I played thirteen games in the National Hockey League last season and am getting used to it."

Hiller, with New York Rangers, will replace Bobby Klirk at left wing beside Phil Watson and Brian Hextall on one of the Rangers' forward lines. Klirk has been relegated to Philadelphia Ramblers of the International - American League, a Ranger farm team.

Short of stature but solidly built, Hiller is the first member of the New York Rangers' famed Three-R system—New York Rovers of the Eastern United States amateur league, Ramblers and Rangers—ever to make the jump from Rovers to Rangers without some professional experience in Philadelphia. Manager Lester Patrick of Rangers brought him up from Rovers late last season and he clicked immediately in the majors. Dutch was leading scorer in the Eastern U.S. circuit before he was promoted. He spent the 1936-37 season in England.

"I was plenty scared when Lester first moved me up to the Rangers last season and I got a real thrill out of it," said Hiller. "After a few games, though, the novelty seems to wear off and you realize you're just playing hockey after all. We played in Toronto my first night and beat the Leafs 4-2. Guess that was my biggest thrill."

"Don't let anybody tell you there isn't a terrific jump between amateur and professional hockey. It's as different as day and night. All this talk about juniors playing better hockey than is played in the N. H. L. is a lot of bunk. Fans like the juniors because they race and tear and skate miles farther than they have to. The pros are smarter, faster and take advantage of all the breaks. Instead of dashing around like the juniors, they wait for the breaks and when they come—bang, in goes a goal."

Dutch has great respect for Boston Bruins' Sauerkraut line of Milt Schmidt, Porky Dumart and Bobby Bauer, also Kitchener boys. "They're going to be one of hockey's greatest lines," he said. "They're great now, for that matter but they're just starting. Schmidt is only about 19 or 20 and he's really a sweetheart. I think Boston will give Rangers the toughest time this season. They're the toughest club in the league to play against. But we've got a real club too." Hiller concluded, "so it should be a great season."

Dutch didn't waste any time getting into the thick of things when Rangers and New York Americans opened an exhibition tour

in Winnipeg. He and Amerks Tommy Anderson started throwing fists near the end of a rugged battle which the Rangers won 2-1 after 10 minutes overtime.
