Nurses Entitled To Adequate Pay

CAPETOWN, Sept. 27. (CP)—

All-round increases in the salaries of nurses in Cape Province of the Union of South Africa were announced by the administrator, J. H. Conradie, when he laid the foundation stone of the Hottentots Holland Hospital here.

"One of the reasons for the shortage in this province is the fact that the scales of salary have been less attractive than those obtained in the Transvaal and the other two provinces," said Mr. Conradie. "I do not mean to suggest that this is the only reason, or even the most important reason, for the shortage in the Cape Province, for it is inconceivable to me that the available supply of trained nurses should be directly proportionate to the attractiveness of the salary scales. The nursing profession has always been characterized by its self-sacrifice and devotion to duty, quite irrespective of remuneration or reward. But I do believe those who enter the nursing profession should receive adequate remuneration for their services."

"Under the new proposals sisters will receive a commencing salary of £150 (\$727.50) instead of £130 (\$620.50) a year, and they will be able to progress to £190 (\$921.50) instead of only £160 (\$776) a year as at present. For staff nurses the annual salary will be increased by £10 (\$48.50)."
