LEADERS OF TWO NATIONS ARE DEADLOCKED OVER CZECHOSLOVAKIAN ISSUE - EUROPE APPEARS TO BE FACING MOST CRITICAL. WEEK-END IN CRISIS

Slovakia; Germany Is Ready

TO GRAB — OTHERWISE SOVIET ATTITUDE IS STILL NOT DEFINITE

LONDON, September 23: (CP)— Temporary abandonment of the Godesberg conversations between Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain of Great Britain and Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany was taken here as an indication that Chamberlain has taken an uncompromising position. Announcement was made that Chamberlain had refused to confer further with Hitler after an apparent deadlock had been reached in their conversations. Sir Neville Henderson, British ambassador to Germany, went into consultation with Joachim von Ribbentrop, German foreign minister, with a view to bringing the two together again and, after a day of suspense in the fateful talks on European peace, came the announcement tonight that Chamberlain would see Hitler again.
