GET READY FOR FLIGHT

Trans-Canada Air Lines Make Progress in Radio Set-up and Pilot Training

MONTREAL, Jan. 28:—With ground radio equipment established and in operation at Winnipeg, Regina, Lethbridge, Cranbrook and Oliver and to be ready at Vancouver by the end of the month, the main set-up of the Trans-Canada Air Lines, providing two-way voice communication between planes and airports, is now practically completed on the western section. Information to this effect is included in a progress report presented to the department of transport by Phillip G. Johnson, vice-president of the air lines. Mr. Johnson is now on his way west on an inspection trip which will occupy several weeks and take him as far as Vancouver.

Trans-Canada Air Line's pilots Mr. Johnson's report shows, are extending their training by making scheduled flights between Winnipeg and Lethbridge and from Vancouver over the Rockies to Lethbridge. "Regular operating procedure is followed on these training flights," Mr. Johnson says. "A flight plan is prepared by the dispatcher and the pilot, before the plane takes off, signed clearance authorizations are obtained. When the flight is completed a report is submitted. In the simulation of actual scheduled flight conditions, valuable experience is obtained by all the personnel. In weekly meetings, operating problems encountered during the previous week are discussed and conclusions reached for future procedure."

At present the Trans-Canada Air Lines have twenty-four pilots operating planes or undergoing training. Three pilots are engaged in the daily service between Vancouver and Seattle. Two are assisting with instruction. The staff will be augmented as facilities for training are available. The pilots' training consists of six stages—instruction in the mechanical function of equipment and accessories, primary Lockheed flying instructions, instrument flying, local range flying, local night flying, advanced instrument and radio range (cross country) flying, seven men are now in the sixth stage.

Ground Staff
The nucleus of the communications department and the maintenance and repairs staff number 46 men at present. There are seven dispatchers and radio operators at Winnipeg, one at Regina, one at Lethbridge and one at Vancouver, four technicians at Winnipeg and one at Vancouver. Air engineers, mechanics and others at Winnipeg, Regina, Lethbridge and Seattle make up a maintenance and repairs staff of 31. In addition, there are five men in the stores and property department at Winnipeg and one at Lethbridge.

Some of the air engineers stationed at Winnipeg are attending a special course of instruction in materials and material testing at the University of Manitoba. Other courses provide additional training in other branches of work. Despite winter conditions, progress in the construction of the hangars at Winnipeg and Lethbridge is satisfactory. Mr. Johnson reports. Concrete foundations have been laid and the buildings will be ready for occupancy in April.

HOSPITAL GOOD WORK

Annual Meeting of Islands Organization Held at Queen Charlotte City; Fairbairn President

QUEEN CHARLOTTE CITY, Jan. 28: On Friday evening last the Skidegate Inlet General Hospital Society held its annual meeting with the largest attendance in years. The retiring president George D. Beattie, was in the chair and he welcomed several new members to the meeting. A. R. Mallory of Port Clements, vice-president, was among those present.

Prior to the election of officers, an interesting discussion on the hospital situation followed the reading of the minutes and the treasurer's report which showed timely assistance from a provincial government grant of \$300, this enabling the new year to be started with a credit balance of \$290. During the past year \$529 was realized through subscriptions and functions in aid of the hospital. Allison's Camp donated \$127.50, the J. R. Morgan Logging Co. and camp \$36; The Lawn Hill Farmers' Institute \$118; Skidegate Mission, \$113.25; Lawn Hill ladies' bridge \$15, and subscriptions from Queen Charlotte City, \$120.

The opinion was expressed that the directors could feel a justifiable pride in the contribution the institution is making and has made to the life of the people of the Queen Charlotte Islands. The hospital was built by the people and for the most part was kept up by the people. That it carries on without debt was a source of satisfaction. The great aim was to minister to the needs of the Islands. During the past thirty years of its history it has met and dealt with every emergency. In Dr. Duncan McCall the society had a splendid superintendent for the hospital, a good competent physician and surgeon and a young man of fine promise.

Timely Recipes

APPLES IN THE MENU

Apples may be rightly regarded as among the cheapest and best of fruits principally because of their high nutritive value. Modern dietitians stress the fact that three vitamins A, B, and C are found in apples. Vitamin A is essential to growth and raises body resistance to disease; vitamin P is essential to growth, stimulates appetite and promotes good digestion, and vitamin C prevents scurvy and also assists in tooth development, helping to prevent tooth decay. In cooking, apples lose none of their virtues.

Apple Pudding (Old Fashioned)
Four large tart Canadian-grown apples, 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon, 1 teaspoon salt, 4 oz. stale bread crumbs, ½ grated nutmeg, 4 eggs.

Pare and chop apples; mix with crumbs; beat yolks of eggs lightly and add to crumbs; then add salt, cinnamon, and nutmeg; then stir in carefully the whites of eggs beaten stiff. Mix thoroughly; steam in a well-greased mould for three hours. Serve with custard or lemon sauce.
