DENTAL SURVEY

Teeth of Local Children Not In As Good Shape As Elsewhere

Under the auspices of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club and with the co-operation of the Provincial Department of Health, a dental survey has been made of the Grade I children in the public schools here by the local dentists. This survey was carried out as a foundation to the dental clinic which the Rotary Club hopes to have in operation very shortly.

The result of the survey shows that the defects in the children's teeth average 6.63 per child. Com-

pared with figures of a similar survey made on the lower mainland and on Vancouver Island, this average is considerably higher.

Parents of these children will receive a report of the findings of the dentists in the survey and it is hoped that they will co-operate in having their children's teeth treated to have these defects corrected, thereby protecting the child's general health for the future.

At the proposed clinic the Rotary Club hopes to be able to extend this service to the under-privileged children.

Riel Survivor Dies Overseas

IPSWICH, Eng., Nov. 16: (CP)—Charles Frank Gayfer, 82, last survivor in England of the Riel Rebellion of 1885, has died here. He had been drawing a disability pension of 55 cents a day from the Canadian government for sunstroke suffered in the Qu'Appelle Valley in the summer of 1885 while serving as a private with the Manitoba Grenadiers.

Born in England, Gayfer went to Canada as a youth, returning to his homeland just before the outbreak of the Great War.

This leaves but one veteran of this campaign on the books of the Canadian government's pension bureau here. He is Trooper Valentine Bruce of Boulton's Mounted Brigade. Bruce now lives in Newcastle, Nottal, and draws a pension for a gunshot wound suffered in a skirmish at Fish Creek in April, 1885.

Whifflets From The Waterfront

Under the direction of Capt. Reg. Green, the outfit of G. W. Powell River and Ocean Falls and will sail at 4 p.m. for Anyox and Stewart whence she will return here tomorrow evening southbound. The vessel brought north a fair-sized list of passengers.

Broader Function Of Church Urged

Missionary Address Given Before First Presbyterian Congregation By Rev. H. G. Funston

The importance of the activity of the church in mission fields—both at home and abroad—was emphasized by Rev. H. G. Funston in preaching Sunday morning at First Presbyterian Church. If the church was to confine itself merely to its local field, it was falling far short of its usefulness and might almost as well cease functioning. 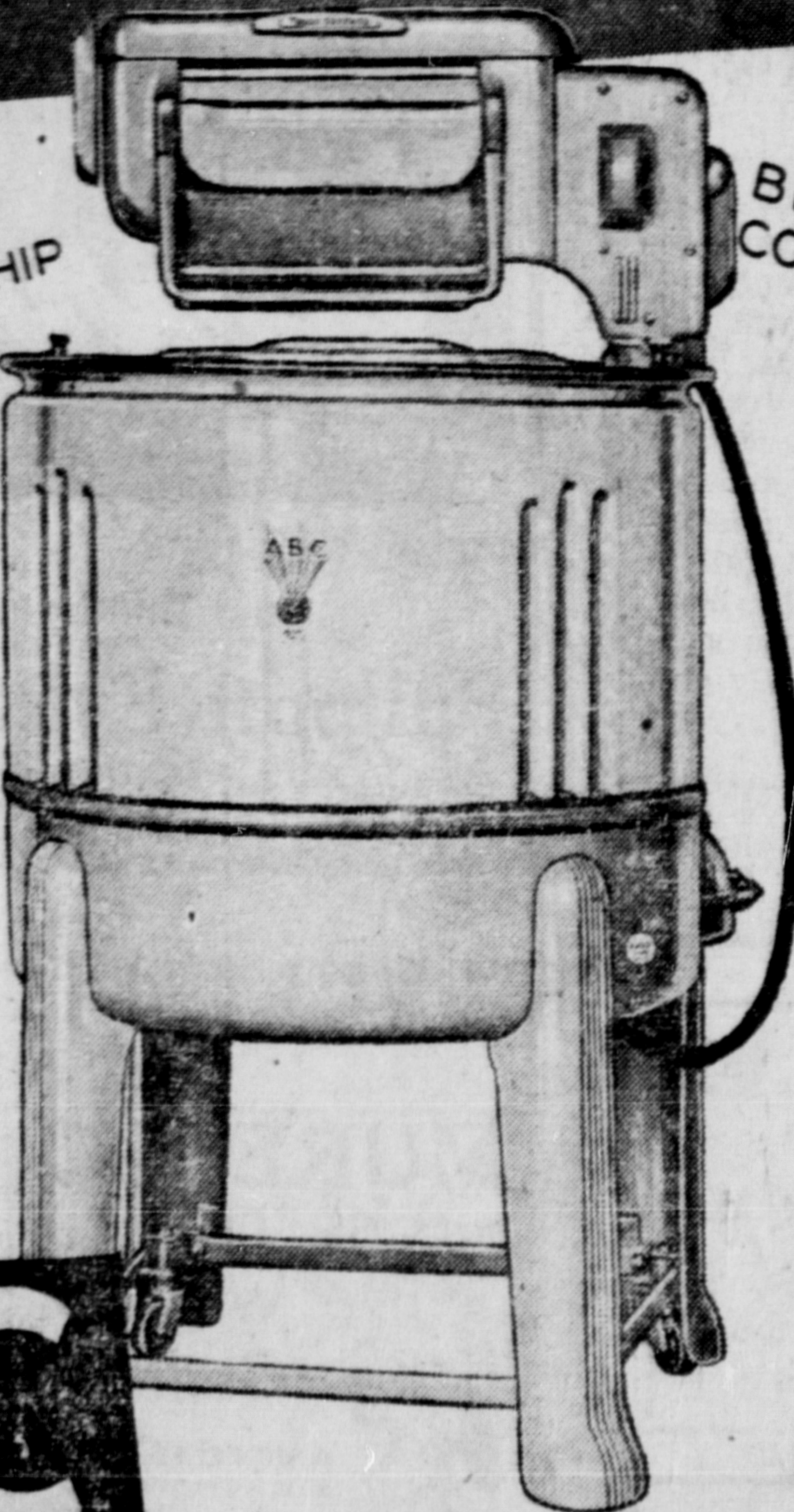
