Better Teachers

While summer vacations are over for Canadian school children, for many of the nation's 700,000 teachers school opening means something like a holiday.

Schools from coast to coast constantly demand a higher educational standard for teaching staffs, which means the final term's school bell for the children summons roughly half the teachers to summer schools for extra training.

The summer schools, geared for fast-paced feaching, often make their pupils work harder than the same teachers work when they return to the school rooms.

Two Canadian provinces, Manitoba and Alberta, have raised the requirements for normal school students this year. They now must have grade 12 standing, equivalent to roughly first year university.

Prince Edward Island will demand a higher standard next year. Two years' training, one year academic followed by one year o normal training will be required to obtain a lowest class teacher's lic-


